

FROM THE HEADMASTER

The end of Term 2 finally saw us back in the Assembly Hall, for the first indoor assembly of the term, at which we were able to recognise John Hamilton for his leadership of the Civil Defence with our annual Leadership Medal. This led into the outstanding Year 12 Leadership Day, attended by students and Principals from high schools throughout Christchurch. Finally, despite the obvious lack of a ceiling, it hosted our parent/teacher meetings. Things are getting back to `normal'! Friday night saw us move into the Dining Hall for the Parents' Association Mid-Winter Drinks event; well over 200 attended, and there was a wonderful atmosphere as we swapped stories of a remarkable term. My thanks to all the parents involved in putting the event on – everyone enjoyed it enormously.

I was in England at Christmas last year for one of the rare 'white Christmas' events – as memorable as it was unusual – and then last week, the heaviest snowfall in Christchurch for many years. Snow in both hemispheres in the same year is probably too much of a good thing. Unlike England, the sun then came out after two days and under the most glorious blue skies, most of it quickly vanished; there was a short time though when it seemed like just one more complication we could have done without.

The snowfall came almost straight after the Chapman Block caused offence to our structural engineers; I was frustrated

at the totally unexpected revelation that its design and construction apparently gave it the architectural equivalent of scurvy, and the dose of remedial vitamin C required would be both expensive and time consuming. Having tried to conceal my previous disappointment that it had suffered no structural damage at all in the



earthquakes, I now attempted to feign regret, unconvincingly I am sure. A recommendation is before the Board about its future, and in due course I will communicate the outcome of their deliberations. The College Register of 1961, when Chapman was constructed, described it as the most beautiful building on the College campus; it probably would not earn that accolade today, but we should not be too quick to dismiss it. Architecture is of its period; some proves to have a timeless appeal, some may not. But perhaps the weakest architecture is that which appears to be what it isn't. There is an argument that anything in design should be challenging if it is to live in the future; that which is comfortable at a first meeting, is already dated. Some styles of architecture have proved to be timeless, and 60's brutalism still has its devotees – so they tell me. I am happy not to be counted amongst them.

The building contained the staff facilities, as well as temporary accommodation for Harper and Julius. We have had a busy



and creative week, and the arrangements arrived at will be developed further in the next few weeks. The old College museum space above the Assembly Hall foyer had been previously cleared and converted, and has now been allocated as a temporary staff room. It was Mr Brian Le Vaillant who suggested I note in this newsletter, 'College staff put in a museum'. As if I would. I am grateful to them in advance for putting up with what are far from ideal circumstances for the time being, but things will improve quite quickly.

Meanwhile, our top priority is to get the work finished on School House. Up to 40 staff have been working on both the north wall reinforcing and the exterior stone work over the holiday. The weather, of course, has not helped – the outside work is now shrouded in plastic to protect it from the worst of the low temperatures, and we have acquired a spectacular banner bearing school crests courtesy of our contractors, Naylor Love. Unfortunately the black tui heads have been a little lost against the black background, bringing the inevitable quip – 'the Head, missing again'.

That was not entirely fair, although during the last break I was in London and then Singapore on two almost back-to-back assignments. The first was the IBSC (International Boys' Schools Coalition) Conference at The City of London Boys' School. The most interesting theme examined the current state of understanding of brain functioning in young people; there has been much research into cognitive function and brain activity (using modern medical scanning imagery) but the focus has now moved beyond merely brain 'geography' (what happens where and why) and towards the more general consideration of the socio-emotional affective conditions against which this activity takes place. The current interest is not just how different brains respond to learning stimuli, but why there is such a variation.

I was able to excuse myself for one day, to catch up with our choir tour in Paris for their recital at the New Zealand Embassy – a memorable evening, in a fleeting visit. I was also able to meet some prospective parents in London, as well as the trustees of the Christchurch Earthquake Appeal Fund; it was uplifting to recognise the commitment on the other side of the world to Christchurch, and its situation. From London, I joined the Asia New Zealand's Principals' Forum in Singapore for six days. Singapore is one of the top performing education systems in the world as measured through PISA tests, and I was keen to find out why. It was an intensive exposure not only to the education system itself, but also to their approach to teacher education, to New Zealand's trading profile in the country, and of course the racial mix which defines Singapore's history. As always, some of the impacts were tangential to the main purpose. I was left, for example, impressed by the country's commitment to conserving and promoting its cultural inheritance, recognising a risk of a homogeneous society of many races, but without a coherent social history. It was likened to a person with amnesia - a clear view of the current, but no recollection of what went before. I wondered whether this paralleled New Zealand to an extent, particularly our part of the South Island, where so much is defined by the European history. Also, in Christchurch at this time, we are tested by the question of how much to sweep away and renew of even that recent story, and how much to conserve. In a real sense, the College may well be contributing even more than before, to that sense of lineage in the city.

I hope you have all enjoyed the break. I notice daffodils are breaking through in the park already, and lambs were in the fields in North Canterbury at the weekend. Spring is not far away. This is always a busy term, and this time will mark the anniversary of that startling morning in September. What a year it has been.

LEADERSHIP MEDAL 2011

John Hamilton CNZM MVO (7836 Flower's) has been awarded the 2011 Christ's College Leadership Medal. Mr Hamilton is the Director of New Zealand's Ministry of Civil Defence and Emergency Management. Following the 22 February earthquake in Christchurch, Mr Hamilton was the National Controller of the Civil Defence Emergency Response. Prior to joining the Ministry of Civil Defence, Mr Hamilton had a long and distinguished career in the New Zealand Air Force as a helicopter pilot and from 2002 through until 2006 he held the position of Chief of Air Force, the highest position in the NZRAF.

Mr Hamilton was presented with the award at a special assembly prior to the Emerging Leaders' Conference, a one day conference on leadership for Year 12 pupils from around the region, hosted by Christ's College in association with The Sir Peter Blake Trust. He told those assembled, "I am flattered because my role in the response,

in September and February, is nothing compared to the work and heartache that you people have been through at the College here and with family and friends in Christchurch."

The Leadership Medal is awarded annually to an Old Boy who has achieved eminence in his chosen field. This can be either in an academic or professional community or any other walk of life.

CURRICULUM

At the risk of labouring matters 'earthquake related', I am aware that there are some very creative rumours doing the rounds amongst boys about what might happen to NCEA assessment as a result of the earthquakes.



It is important that everyone understands that the NZQA's bottom line is the maintenance of the integrity of NCEA as a

qualification, so boys cannot expect some sort of 'easy ride' as a result. NZQA staff totally understand that there must be some allowance for the fact that students in some cases have been adversely affected by the 'quakes, especially in schools that have been totally displaced, and are now site sharing. They are working hard to ensure that they retain a human face to their work, but the qualification is the qualification, and it must stand for the same levels of achievement as always.

In order to make sure that we are all 'on the same page', I have reprinted below some of the relevant information taken directly from the NZQA web page. I have highlighted in bold particular sections that may help to settle some of the unfounded speculation, and have added commentary in brackets to help with interpretation. Initiatives being implemented by NZQA

1) NZQA will provide schools with advice and guidance on programme planning. This will include reducing the assessment load to a manageable level without compromising curriculum and programme integrity, and the students' ability to gain qualifications. Students can be assessed against fewer credits than may have been planned for in a normal school year, and still meet the requirements for NCEA. Decisions about assessment load are best taken by teachers and students based on their particular circumstances.

(Note: this does NOT mean that students don't need to gain fewer credits to 'get over the bar' with qualifications, but merely that schools may wish to offer fewer credits in total. At College we have chosen not to adopt this course of action, and have successfully managed to recover lost time across courses.)

2) For external assessment, (mainly examinations) a separate "derived" grade process will be established based on the procedures used successfully for Christchurch students after the September 2010 earthquake. The process will allow teachers to provide an estimate of the grade a student would have received for their external assessment under normal circumstances. This grade will only be awarded where appropriate supporting evidence for a student is made available by the school. Student results notices and the Record of Achievement will record the awarded grade as normal.

3) A simplified process for collecting evidence for internal assessment will be established. This will take the form of a template which teachers can use to identify evidence of

achievement for the purpose of awarding standards. This process will save valuable teaching and learning time by reducing the need for formal assessment. NZQA will also allow additional internal assessment time for affected schools until the end of February 2012, and accept these results towards 2011 qualifications.

4) NZQA will also develop a special credit inclusion appeal process. School leavers, who have narrowly missed achieving their Level 3 NCEA and/or University Entrance, could apply for this if their situation appears not to have been satisfactorily addressed in other ways.

5) NZQA will continue to discuss with universities, and other tertiary providers, issues around entrance requirement, and advise them of how NZQA intends to manage results, derived grades, and other data.

9) NZQA will extend the submission date for portfolio-based externally assessed standards in subjects such as Technology and Graphics.

10) Schools will be given additional assistance with managing an expected increase in applications for Financial Assistance for fees in 2011.

Worthy of special note is that derived grades must still be based on evidence i.e. staff cannot simply invent a grade that they think is right for a student. As always this requirement makes achievement in the Term 3 trial examinations of vital importance should any boys need to apply for derived grades for any reason at all, as this will be an important source of reliable assessment evidence. Class tests offer similar evidence. Please remember that derived grades are only available for external standards (those assessed by examination in November).

This year's trial examinations run from the 7 - 13 September.

And finally from me, a reminder that applications for Financial Assistance are due with me by **Friday 19 August**.


