I may stop writing these pieces. There is at least some concern that my lengthy references to our quadrangle at the end of last year may have tempted fate, the rest now being history. Two weeks ago, I finished with optimistic references to lambs, daffodils and Spring. If anyone has something they would like me make go wrong, feel free to get in touch. Jacq Gilbert, our Publications Manager, has suggested I apply reverse logic. You will have to read on.

We had no option but to close for a couple of days in what, we are told, was a 'once in 50 year' weather event. The boarders, of course, stayed on site – my thanks to them, and to the boarding staff and others who helped make the best of it. It is always good to see a positive attitude, and an ability to develop beyond the conventional; snowballing was raised to a new level of technical sophistication, though the beginnings of an ingenious snow-board park involving at least one roof,



was deemed a little too ambitious. Reopening on Wednesday turned out to be the right decision, and at the time of writing the thermometer is edging in the right direction. Very few were missing on Wednesday – a great effort all round.

As a member, I receive the monthly journal of the Institute of Physics, and try to at least remain aware



of the directions of current innovation and research, whilst having long since given up trying to maintain anything near a mastery of the detail. A more accessible section is devoted to readers' letters. I am indebted to Michael Bland, of London, for his permission to reproduce his comment on 'The Thermodynamics of Teenagers' which I thought might amuse you.

In his delightful Lateral Thoughts article "The thermodynamics of babies" (March p72), Robert Craig asks if teenagers might also have thermodynamic properties. I can assure him that in the early stages, they continue to follow the principles of classical physics: for example, to every action there is an equal and opposite reaction, and it takes a great deal of energy to restore them from a state of chaos back to one of order.



But as they fall increasingly under the influence of gravity - thus finding getting out of bed almost impossible - teenagers become more quantum in nature. They have their own version of the uncertainty principle, such that you might know where they are now, but not where they have been or what they were doing (and it is better not to know). Also, like Schrödinger's cat, for a considerable part of the morning they appear to be both alive and dead at the same time. Then comes the astrophysics stage, during which there is dark matter everywhere, they exist in an alternative universe - and financially they are a black hole.

As nature continues to throw complications our way, schedules are slipping a little. The piles for the new Harper House base on Gloucester Street should have been completed by now, and of course the stone masons working on the outside of School House are not enjoying the conditions. Inside continues to progress really well; we are hoping to put the heating on tomorrow to start warming the house through, ready for its eager returning residents. We are aiming to have the boys safely installed in time for Monday 29th August, just a week later than scheduled months ago. I am grateful to all involved – the commitment to getting the House back to its former glory has been outstanding.

I have had a couple of questions about the Chapman building. As the engineers worked through our main buildings, subjecting each to the same full process, Chapman was not thought to be a priority on the basis of its previous recent assessment, and its lack of damage in the earthquakes. Our other main buildings had been through the process previously, been fully reported, recommendations made, and repairs undertaken. The new evaluation caught us all unawares – had there been any expectation of such an outcome, it would have had a higher priority in the assessment process. The outcome should be a reassuring one all round – the processes since the earthquakes have been far more detailed than ever before, and have given us a thorough overview of all our buildings.

The future of Chapman is still undecided, as the Board awaits a peer review of the engineers' findings. However, I have had one very creative suggestion about how the end of this controversial feature of our campus may be 'recorded' (I think the suggestion might have been 'celebrated') Remembering Jacq Gilbert's advice, I am totally confident Chapman will continue to give great pleasure to all for many years to come.

We continue to absorb disruptions, whilst keeping the boys focused on their schedules, and those involved in Winter Tournament week must be particularly pro-active to use spare time effectively. It is good to hear that many used the recent 'snow days' to good effect, working on assignments. We are looking forward to the weekend – if the forecast is accurate, some wonderful skiing is in prospect. Weather permitting, Jane and I look forward to meeting with the Hawkes Bay CCOBA members this weekend, and sharing with them our satisfying progress at 'HQ'.

Few of us expected the wonderful exhibition of photographs by Yann-Arthus Bertrand outside the College, but it is a great addition to the landscape. If you have not yet had a chance to look at the pictures, and digest the commentary, I recommend it – it has particular atmosphere when illuminated at night. Our own Darryn George's spectacular piece on the end of the Council offices, should also not be missed. Further evidence that artistic and creative work is alive and well, was the recent Big Band concert in the hall; it was outstanding.

Finally, we all extend our support and encouragement to the Chaffey family, following the sudden loss of Clare last week, mother of Tim (yr 9 School House). A number of our boys from North Canterbury will be attending the funeral with their families this week, and others travelling from College.

This season has not been an easy one, with the September earthquake affecting all three practice areas normally used. The College XI has been competing in the Canterbury Hockey Association's Men's 2nd Grade Competition, finishing a win behind the winners of the grade, but in such a closely fought competition this was only good enough for 5th place. In the build up to the tournament, College has been playing in the annual 1st XI competition, beating Darfield HS in the quarterfinals, but losing to St Andrew's College in the strokes competition following a 1 all draw at fulltime.

It has been a season of close matches, even the ones that perhaps on reflection should not have been so close. Apart from a huge 10-1 win over St Bede's College in the very first round, most games yielded only a couple of goals. To compete at the Rankin Cup, the big challenge will be to make the most of the rare goal scoring opportunities created.

The team has been coached by Penny Tattershaw since 2003, despite her demanding position as Head of the Boys' School at Cathedral Grammar School, and managed by Graeme Worner.

Five boys represented Canterbury at National tournaments this year. Kip Mouldey and goal keeper Will Hurst played at the Under 18 tournament where Canterbury finished 7th. Jack Woodley was co-captain of the Canterbury Under 15A team that also included Dominic Newman. In a great finals performance Canterbury won the National Under 15 title. Benji Andrews played in the National Under 15B tournament where Canterbury finished 3rd.

MINISTRY OF HEALTH REQUEST

The Ministry of Health has requested help from schools in alerting parents to a measles outbreak in the North Island, which may spread to other parts of the country. The outbreak is mainly affecting unimmunised children. Measles can result in serious complications, with about one in ten people who are infected requiring hospitalisation.

The Ministry is asking parents and caregivers to ensure that their children's immunisations are up-to-date. All those attending Tournament Week (Aug 22-26) should be immunised beforehand and the Ministry states that all unimmunised students who were exposed to measles in

the two weeks prior to the event should not attend. The Ministry also requests that any student with measles must stay away from school for seven days from the appearance of the rash. Unimmunised students who have been in close contact with measles should stay away from school for fourteen days from their last contact. These exclusions also apply to sporting events.

Darryn George, Head of the Art Department at Christ's College, is the artist of the largest work of art currently on display in New Zealand, *The Lamb's Book of Life (Folder Wall)*.

On Friday morning Mr George had the opportunity to abseil down his work. One bystander on Montreal Street quipped "Talk about suffer for your art!"

Previously designed for the former Government Life Tower Building in Cathedral Square, Mr George's revised work is on display on the newly exposed western wall of the Christchurch Civic Offices, formerly obscured by the St Elmo Courts Building. Mr George's design is based upon an internal view of a filing cabinet drawer with the receding label tabs of suspended folders seen as a metaphor for the function of records and registers in Christian theology.

He says "with the design of the numerous folders and the black sack cloth-like material that the work is produced on, it will be hard to avoid making connections with memorials or mourning pieces to all that we have lost to the earthquakes."
