

Welcome to the first 'In Black and White'.

I had expected to open with a jaunty summary of the names which were suggested by parents and staff, and will return to them, but of course our week has been overshadowed by the sudden loss of 'Scotty Mac' on Monday.

Scott MacDonald had been an integral part of our boarding community for nine years, and was universally liked and admired. A gentle, civil, compassionate and highly principled man, he acted as a friend and mentor to many boys over the years. His sudden collapse in Richards House tested the boys who were present, and they managed themselves superbly. I was able to speak to the house, shortly after his death was confirmed, and I asked them to regard their experience as a test, through which they would emerge stronger and more complete. A full and meaningful life, as I said in my Prize Giving speech last year, can only be lived when the



fragility of life and the reality of death are fully grasped. We are pleased to be able to offer our support to his family and close friends with Scott's funeral in Chapel on Saturday. Boys are invited to attend if they wish, in sports uniform, but I have emphasized that school commitments must come first. I believe they understand the meaning of obligation, as Scott so clearly did. We will miss him.

'Black and White' was the name of a newspaper once produced within the school, so our new name has a historical precedent. A number of parents suggested it, but the first (by a short period) was Julie Holden mother of Jonathan Hartland. She has received the promised recognition! We selected a durable, appropriate and easily identified title, but others offered plenty of entertainment. I was pleased to discount three suggestions of 'Simon Says' (thankfully I was spared 'Simple.....'), I was very taken with 'College gen' (alluding to a protein without which I gather a body would fall apart). A member of legal fraternity suggested 'Suspended Sentences', and the 'electronic' aspect was reflected in 'College Bytes'; anyone with roots in the north of England could also make a jest out of pronouncing 'e-College' (which in any case came too close to a health risk). I was amused by 'Greys (sic) anatomy' (a body of black and white experience, I assumed), and finally I was happy to discount Christ's thoughts, messages, chronicles and even epistles, even though the return of the electronic theme in 'Christ's Bytes' did, briefly, suggest a reference to sustaining the multitude. But we are delighted to bring you 'In Black and White' (which you will notice is now in colour...)

I have recently pointed out to the staff that we are halfway through the current Priorities document, a summary of areas for school development from 2008 – 2012. I thought we would include a copy in here for your refreshment. Behind this simple summary document is a management plan and more detailed objectives. In most areas some real progress has been made. I took the opportunity, coinciding with this year's offers of places, to refresh our internal reflection on the school's points of difference. It has been such a fruitful exercise, I am considering including a simple parent survey in 'In Back and White' in the near future. At the same time we are preparing a new prospectus, and again parent input will be sought.

THE QUESTION IS.....

'In Black and White' is our new version of the way in which Christ's College has communicated with its parents over the years. In the 1850's parents found out about subjects, teachers, sports results and terms by reading the newspaper.

From 1871 to 1952 booklets were published two or three times a year with boys ordered in classes and subjects by examination results and these were posted out to parents. Attached to them were various written communications, everything from a simple date that the College would open in the next term or next year, to material that would now be included in a prospectus. The College List took over some of this role in about 1959 with expanded information about staff, boys and the way in which parents could make contact with the College.

In 1981 a very simple photocopied Newsletter was introduced to parents and friends of the school " provided that inspiration lasts and there is news available". It became glossy in black and white with Issue 13 and was re-named the Christ's College Newsletter. Full colour arrived in April 1996 and it lasted until the winter of 2001 when it was superseded by College Magazine which has now reached its twenty first issue.

Rob Zordan's "Inaugural Letter to Parents", dated 7 May 1997 became College Newsletter in its next issue. It was a monthly publication which recorded events which had passed rather than advertised those which were still to happen. The emphasis changed gradually to include a Headmaster's Letter, forthcoming events and important school notices. By November 1998 this A4 folded and stapled booklet had become Parents Newsletter and in October 2003 Parent News. It retained its same name until its recent demise even while changing its format to folded A3 in May 2007.

So now we are going to have 'In Black and White' which will be delivered to us as a downloadable pdf file once a fortnight. The strange thing is that it will be collected by the archives in its printed out form – we can't yet trust hardware and software to still be able to talk to each other into the future, nor can we be sure that CD's and DVD's will survive.

The burning question now is – how long will this one last and how many times will it change its name?

CURRICULUM

This year boys will make their subject choices online, entering selections directly into an online database. Every boy will receive a written instruction on how to do this in the week before the advisory evening. The instruction will include log on and password instructions. Once boys have entered their choices they are asked to print out a copy of their choices. This form requires your signature before it is returned to your son's Housemaster.

Applications for Financial Assistance for NCEA examination fees must be filed with NZQA no later than 27 August. It would be appreciated if you could submit applications at least a week in advance to allow time for processing before we submit the applications. The conditions for eligibility (quoted from the NZQA website) are:

"To be eligible for financial assistance the applicant (normally the parent or guardian of the candidate) must be the fee-payer and meet at least one of the following criteria:

- be receiving a Work and Income or Study Link benefit (benefit-based applications)
- have a joint family income that would entitle the applicant to receive a Community Services Card (income-based applications)
- be a fee-payer with two or more children who are candidates (multiple candidate applications), where the total fees to pay would
 otherwise be more than the \$200 multiple candidate maximum"
