FROM THE HEADMASTER

We have just under two weeks to go, to the end of this extraordinary year. For some the start of a rest period, but all sorts of activity will break out on the campus. We are hosting a number of school Prize Givings and carol services, junior schools will be visiting the Chapel to leave Christmas gifts at the Cathedral's usual Christmas tree, and we have a number of other public functions using our facilities. At the same time, floor levellers are moving into (or rather under) the dining hall to lower the floor so that dropped apples will no longer roll briskly to the side walls as they have done since February. Most of Harper/Julius is now stripped out ready for repairs once all consents are in place, and that project is proceeding well. Accelerated progress should be visible from now on. I am told the builders have found some interesting antiquities, not all of them worthy of public exhibition. Archaeology in a boys' school is always going to be 'interesting', and rightly so. The Chapman Block is also, of course, on its way to the history books straight after the end of term.


All will notice the changed 'look' of the school when you come in the gates. I hope you have the chance to admire the restoration of School House – the rebuilt stonework visible is remarkable, and our new 'picture' concealing the top floor support woodwork has been much admired. On the other gable (less visible behind Jacobs) we have decided to simply paint the wood structure, so that all can see the engineering involved. This timber work will support the renovations,

with the new reinforcing within the masonry, until the lime mortar is fully cured and we can be sure the local geology has exhausted itself completely. Fine work can not be rushed – I hope all can appreciate the quality of the work being executed on our beautiful buildings, ensuring they will continue to be enjoyed and



admired by future generations. The remaining scaffolding will be down very soon, and the grounds facing the river restored. Less interesting perhaps, but nevertheless evident progress, three of our quad classrooms are on the way over the road to the staff car park, and the quad will take on a much more open look for the new year.

It was good to meet our new boys again, and their parents, at our new entrants' barbecue, held in lovely weather. There was a great sense of anticipation for next year. I am often asked about our roll for next year, and am pleased to say we will be down around thirty overall in the school, a smaller percentage reduction than happened during major economic downturns of the past. Considering what we have been through, the unprecedented impacts on people's lives and finances, and ongoing uncertainty for the future, it is humbling that the vast majority of the school community continue to see their sons' educations as such a priority. We will certainly live up to that confidence.



A large number of parents were at the CPIT marae for the Powhiri in conclusion of our Te Ao Maori programme for Year 9 and 10 last week. The boys seemed to get a lot out of it once again and we are always looking to develop related activities further. The Year 10s have set off for camp this week, and I will escape from the desk for a few days to enjoy some decent tramping with them. I am quite immune, incidentally, to comments about my pink tent. The following week, off again with Year 9 for what will be, sadly, a truncated camp after the necessary cancellation in Term 1. I missed that early opportunity to get to know some of our new entrants a little better, so hope to make up for it. Then we will hold our two Prize Givings, and then end the school year as ever with our final Chapel service. I am delighted that our Prizes this year will be presented by Mrs Marie Utley, mother of our Head Boy Will Utley, for the juniors, and the Very Reverend Peter Beck, Dean of Christ Church who has been a most welcome lodger, with the rest of the Cathedral 'family', with us this year.

The biggest challenge this year is our 'Carols On the Quad' event, to replace our hugely popular and always memorable carol service in the Cathedral. The replacement temporary cathedral, hopefully going ahead in due course, will not have the previous capacity, and so we need to look ahead to some years without the event we had grown so accustomed to. This year will be an experiment – and I am grateful to the Chapel and music staff, and particularly to Rob Donaldson for driving the arrangements towards what we hope will be a collective celebration of our safe arrival at the end of the year. It is weather dependent of course – and Christchurch is notably fickle – so we will make a final decision on the morning of the event. If the weather is dreadful, we will simply cancel and there will be a 'plan B' for the House events around it. If the weather is just not particularly good, we will invoke my grandmother's maxim - 'no such thing as bad weather, just unsuitable clothing'. Anything up to light drizzle, bring an umbrella and a flask of tea. As I commented the other day when asked by a weather pessimist what we would do if it rained, at least black bin liners with head and arm holes cut out will be College colours. Parents are invited to come early for a seat, but we have been used to 'standing room only' in the Cathedral for some years. The service will be shorter than previously. We have revised the start time – please note it is now 6.00pm.

As you will know, for the first time ever our 1st XI is through to the national finals of the Gillette Cup, one of six regional winners joining the round robin competition this year at Lincoln. Unfortunately, the competition has been moved a week earlier than usual, and our team are due to play their first match on our last day, creating a disappointment for the players and their parents. However, this is a great opportunity for the team, and we will do what we can to compensate for effects of the clash for them.

During Term 1 of next year, we will be holding a major parents' evening to look once more at the school's position on, and advice about, access to alcohol by students outside school, across the whole school community. We are hoping that many parents, particularly those in the younger years, will make an effort to attend. The date will be published in the next calendar.

Very soon into next term, we will be signing off the functional requirements for our new 'West End' building before the intensive period of design work begins. Shortly thereafter a more firm impression of our wonderful new facilities will be shared with you. The attached picture (following page) was taken on Sunday, and may be the last aerial view of the school before the Chapman block disappears. We are also beginning preparation for the next five year plan for the College, as part of which a survey of all parents will shortly be going out, as previously advertised. It will be on-line, and I do very much hope as many of our community as possible will be able to help us in this very important review of all aspects of College life.

FILM WINS AGAIN

'Wahrheit' - Truth, a film written as part of a Year 13 German class project, has won the Goethe Institut Year 11-13 section of the national German film competition.

The story is that a political party wins the election, but then a member of the party (Harry Tothill) overhears the leader (Campbell Beulink) saying that they had rigged the vote. A party henchman (Callum Haynes) sees Harry eavesdropping on the info, and they have him killed, but not before he writes what he has discovered in a code for someone to find and publish. The other henchmen are played by Sam Parkin and Jack Sissons. The detective (Andrew Carrell) finds the code during his investigations, and has it deciphered by his French code-breaker friend (Jan Dierickx). But then Jan is shot by the henchmen and a chase ensues - the detective jumps out of the window, runs through a wood (as the henchmen fire shotguns at him - this really happened out at Campbell's place!), bursts into a house and writes the information on a computer to publish it on a website, the henchmen rush in and get to him just as he pushes 'send.....'

It was written in German by the class after a lengthy joint effort on the storyline. The theme this year was rather obscure: "ABCDE". We used these letters as the name of the political party and the website to which the detective sent the info.

'Wahrheit' was brilliantly directed and filmed by Michael van de Water of Somes House and also won the Best Film and Best Director Awards at the Christ's College Interhouse Film Festival.

RIP CHAPMAN BLOCK

In February 1962, 576 boys returned from their holidays to what the Editorial in *The Register* called "surely the College's most beautiful building - the four storied Chapman block". Boys will return from their summer holidays in February 2012 with a view from Big School that has not been seen for fifty years.

The Chapman Block is named after Thomas Chapman who had donated money for the construction in 1939 of the fives and squash courts, which were partially demolished during the building's construction. He was at College from 1863-1869 and captained the First XI and First XV. He also won the Open Fives competition in 1868. A President and Life Member of the Christ's College Old Boys' Association, he was a generous benefactor not only to College, but to other organisations within Christchurch.

The building, as Sir Miles Warren records in his autobiography, was his first sizeable commission for Christ's College. He describes it as a "severe, nononsense, diagrammatic design that was stark and uncompromising". The engineer, Lyall Holmes, produced a structural design which was innovative using load bearing masonry of concrete blocks with aggregate faced walls to link in with the surrounding buildings. It was built by Fletchers and survived three major earthquakes and the associated aftershocks. Yet it is the design which has been its undoing. The Headmaster in a previous edition of In Black and White described it as having the equivalent of architectural scurvy, with the result being that the Board has decided it will be demolished.


Initially the Chapman Block housed Art, Geography, Biology, Physics, the Common Room and workroom, toilets, a changing room, the Pottery Room and Press Club. Over the years History, Social Studies, Divinity and Media Studies and more recently Harper House and Julius House, have also made use of the space. The Common room was expanded, and a workroom created downstairs, with facilities for the increased numbers of female staff. Remodelling provided studies for senior staff and an office for the Common Room Secretary. The interior walls in the stairwell told the story of the First XV and the large windows overlooking Upper witnessed many an Athletics Day and rugby match.

The building completed the fourth side of a smaller quad, later named Upham Quad. It is a building of its time, and in this context was much visited by architectural students. Its time has ended.



When my wife, Helen, and I were Palestine-Israel Christmas Eve on joined the we community at the Anglican Cathedral in Jerusalem.



Anglicans have a special relationship

with Armenians who are one of the denominations that are in charge of the Bethlehem Church complex.

That evening, the Anglican congregation took busses from Jerusalem to Bethlehem. While thousands were gathering on the square in front of the Bethlehem Church for Midnight Mass, the Armenians let us in through a little-known entrance to spend a moment in a cave under the church, praying at the "actual place" where Jesus was born.

Returning back to the Jerusalem cathedral for our own Midnight Mass, the Dean, who was preaching, discovered that somewhere he had mislaid his sermon text; disaster, for him, on this central occasion. In actual fact, it led to him preaching one of the best sermons I have ever heard. Disaster transformed to positive.

Saint Augustine and others throughout history, spoken of the story of Adam and Eve's disobedience as being a "happy fault", Felix culpa. That story is about the origin of evil, pain, and death. Yet, Felix culpa, that disaster led to the glory of the incarnation, God becoming human, celebrated at Christmas time.

In essence, when all goes well, it takes little to make a positive life. Suffering is not good in and of itself, but stories of overcoming adversity inspire us. The real skill and glory is weaving disaster into an even-better, unplanned-for future.

This year we have all been part of disaster, with destruction, pain, and death.

In our resilience, in our care for each other, in our focus on people, may we, with God with us (the meaning of Emmanuel), observe this Christmas as a celebration of our hope and determination for a better future.

STEVE JOBS AND HIS CONTRIBUTIONS TO MUSIC

Following the passing of Steve Jobs, we can look back on his life and see how he changed our lives. Allied to this is his contribution and impact on the music industry, and how he changed our cultural understanding of music.

As the Internet took hold, Jobs had his eye on the music industry and early on recognised

that technology could influence culture to reach consumers. From his creative mind has spawned iTunes, the iPod, Airplay, iPhone, iPad, iTunes, Garage Band, even Apple TV, and of course podcasts and apps. And it wasn't just the technology he was concerned with. It was having access to the content that created the greatest impact. The result of having access to a vast selection of music was a means of shifting control away from the radio stations and recording companies into the hands of consumers, who could choose what they listened to and when. Of course, for decades we have been able to listen to what we choose via LPs and CDs, but now we have a portable option through iTunes via the iPod.

Not that the iPod was the first mp3 player on the market, but it was the sleekest, and the most user-friendly. I have a few portable mp3 players, but the iPod is the easiest to use and I think that this ease-of-use is one reason for its popularity. They also have a clean lines look. In a recent *Time* magazine Harry McCracken and Lev Grossman pointed out that, 'even the white iPod earphones themselves became a fixture in American society.'

But Jobs' contributions to music are larger than that. While the iPod had important ramifications for music lovers - the decline of the CD, the physical condensing of the music collection, the general mobility of music - the major long-term change of Jobs' neat little device is the way we now think about music.

Consider how the iPod has made music become an instant reality. Millions of people walk from one place to another with those distinctive iPod earphones in their ears, (and other types of course - headphones are less damaging to you ear drums, as the sound is a little further away). But, how disconnected these people become from their surroundings. In some ways, one can view this use of music as imposed self-isolation.

Another way to look at this practice is to note its effect on the way we value music itself. Has the mobility of music changed the value of music? Music now becomes just a part of everything else we hear, just above the sound of rustling leaves or of the passing cars as we take a walk or jog. And we don't have to talk, or even think, any longer as we take our walk, we can just plug in! I have created my own little world. It's all about me - or should it be; it's all about i?

Yet another way in which Jobs has changed our thinking in music is what we now call music. All tracks are now referred to as 'songs' and my iPod can store, I don't know, 250 songs to the gigabyte. But what is a song? Traditionally it is words set to music, but Apple refers to any piece of music as a song, instrumental or otherwise. Referring to music as songs has now become part of our vocabulary. Incidentally, how long is a 'song'? The average song length is 3 to 4 minutes long and your iPod can store x many. Really? The longest piece of music is Beatus Vir by Jacob Mashak - coming in at 11 hours. So, stick that in your iPod!

And of course, we can. Steve Jobs has revolutionized the way we interact with music. Gone are the days when I had music stored on compact discs, or even, cassette tapes. So, we can thank Steve Jobs for making the lives of music teachers, and others, a little easier. His innovative and creative mind has started something big. And to think he did it without wearing a suit, blazer or tie!
