

FROM THE HEADMASTER

I was pleased to welcome our new Year 9 entrants and their parents to their new school yesterday, and I extend the same warm welcome to those also joining the school in other years. I hope all will very soon feel completely at home, and fully involved in everything the school has to offer.

I shared with the staff yesterday a suitable description of 2011 given to us by Dickens in the opening of a 'Tale of Two Cities':

It was the best of times, it was the worst of times, it was the age of wisdom, it was the age of foolishness, it was the epoch of belief, it was the epoch of incredulity, it was the season of Light, it was the season of Darkness, it was the spring of hope, it was the winter of despair, we had everything before us, we had nothing before us.

And yet, as promised, and it was no surprise to me, our examination results were again something to be proud of. Excellence endorsements at nearly three times the national average at Level 1 and Level 3, and no less than five times at Level 2. More excellence endorsements means fewer at merit, of course, but at all levels a combined merit and excellence proportion twice the national average. Overall pass rates are similarly impressive – boys of all abilities achieved well. I say I was not surprised; the 'sustained culture of urgency' we described last year ensured superb efforts from the staff, and a fine response from the boys. One consequence will be a larger than usual number of Gold Badges worn proudly around the school this year, a tangible reflection of the boys' response to the challenge that was 2011. I could not be more pleased that our highest academic honour will have such a profile.



During the break, there has been a large amount of work done on site once again - but, as always, as buildings are returned to their former state, it is difficult to appreciate the scale of what has been achieved. The only additional damage of consequence from December 23rd, was to the façade of the old maths block. Already out of use and awaiting redevelopment as part of the new west end of College, its future is now being reviewed; it would be premature to anticipate the final decision, but should it find itself on the roll-call of earthquake casualties, the new development would take another spectacular step forward. It was interesting that there were a number of comments in the recent parent survey stressing the hope that the new buildings would be modern but sympathetic to the College 'style' - 'please not another Chapman Block' was typical. We have recently seen the latest draft iteration, reflecting a lot of constructive feedback, and I can assure you it will be everything we would hope for. An impression of the development will be made available as soon as it has outline Board approval.



Meanwhile, the centre of the school looks much better with three portables removed, and nearly all the quad buildings in great shape, with the exception of Harper/Julius. The strengthening scheme has to include the tower area, and we are advancing future plans for a redesigned dining hall kitchen at the same time. Whilst no time scale is proposed at this stage, the vision is clear and the repairs needed to Harper/Julius will be fully integrated with that future ambition. We are moving ahead with all possible haste.

Returning to the parent survey, my thanks to all who responded and for the wealth of most helpful comment received. A summary is being prepared, and the general findings will be published later along with some particular areas for further evaluation. One area of natural and general concern was the prevalence of drugs and the use of alcohol amongst young people in Christchurch, and its impact on our school members. It appeared to me that the most difficult line between confidentiality in dealing with the vulnerability of individuals affected, and explaining the school's methods and providing reassurance about the school's position and the robustness of responses, is a difficult one to draw. With that in mind, I ask you to set Friday 2 March aside in your diaries, and if at all possible come to the planned Parent Forum which appears in the new calendar. At this event, we will not be making a range of presentations. Instead, I will explain some of the conflicts involved, the school's policies and practices, and also available will be a doctor and a lawyer to answer your questions and comment on our approach. I hope parents of younger boys will attend; we will be offering clear advice and guidelines particularly about alcohol access amongst younger boys, an area where I believe some decisive intervention is required. A few years ago we ran a number of parent discussion groups around the city, which were very useful for those who attended but the overall attendance was low considering the degree of expressed concern at that time. These are not matters the school can legislate for and manage without a very high level of parental endorsement and support – I urge you be a part of this important conversation evening, but will of course provide a summary of the event for those boarder parents from more remote places unable to be with us.

My wife and I have been able to share in some College rowing during the holiday, and also enjoyed the Trans Tasman Cricket Festival hosted this year at Shore School, North Sydney. I always gain a great deal from chatting to parents on such occasions, and was able to use the informal settings to get some insights into other issues raised in the survey. One area is the College uniform, and whether some changes are appropriate; once again our suit was raised by respondents in the survey, and the parents I have recently spoken to shared some of the same views. One parent in the survey put two interesting matters together – one was my frequent encouragements for the boys to cycle to school, and the second was how uncomfortable that is to do in the suit! I repeat the former, and confess hadn't thought about the latter, but it is another reason to structure parent and student consultation about general uniform issues. We will be doing that shortly. That I hope will be some encouragement to the parent who commented they had responded the same way in three surveys but 'nothing had happened'!

As we move into 2012, we are all looking ahead and hoping for a calmer and more predictable year. However as I recently read 'It's a characteristic of human nature that the best qualities, called up so quickly in a crisis, are very often hardest to find in a prosperous calm' (Shantaram – GD Roberts). We had by all accounts an outstanding year in 2011, and we must retain every element that contributed to that success as we move forward, and make sure they are just as evident even when less critical.

Thank you for the feedback about 'Carols on the Quad' – there could have been no better way to conclude the year as a community, and it certainly made an impression on many. We may well have started a new 'tradition'.

FRANCE ART AND LANGUAGE TOUR

The France Art and Language Tour has been approved for September 2013. This tour will explore Nice and those parts of the South of France made famous by Chagall, Cézanne, Matisse and many others, and will include homestays so that the boys get a feel of real French life. CURRICULUM NOTES

The education profession has often been riven with notions that may be intuitively appealing but which are subsequently proven to be incorrect. In this camp we could easily place the 'learning styles' debate, which ran through the educational world in the 90s, and is still alive today.

The notion that our behaviours in part determine our success is also intuitively appealing, but in this case may be backed up with more robust research data collected by Art Costa and his team through the 1970s and beyond. Costa theorised that there are behaviours that are critical to success (regardless of the field of endeavour), and his team collected data across national, cultural and racial boundaries to test the idea.

His research was subsequently published as the framework that he titled 'Habits of Mind'. Costa theorises that there are (at least) 16 key behaviours that are crucial to success. I won't list them all here, but I suspect that few of them would surprise you. Such behaviours as Persistence (sticking with a task until it is finished), Managing Impulsivity (avoiding distractions) and Striving for Accuracy (checking and rechecking to make sure that we have something right) are high on the list (although Costa had no intention of creating a hierarchy).

Given the distractions that were a part of our daily life in 2011, the College NCEA examination results are a comment on the extraordinary effort put in by staff and boys alike. They are a comment on the application of the sorts of behaviours that generate success. The loss of class time meant that teachers and boys were forced into avoiding distraction, and they had to be persistent in the face of the regular disruptions that Mother Nature forced upon us.

We all hope for a much more seismically settled year this year, so what might the application of Art Costa's Habits look like in 2012? Probably no different to what they looked like last year. Boys are much more likely to be successful if they avoid distraction and focus on the job at hand. When studying and completing prep, turning off the internet and switching off cell phones might be a start. Making the effort to continue with a task until it is completed is also common sense. So we should expect boys to 'stick with it', to make sure that they complete what they started. As Thomas Edison is reputed to have said on his invention of the electric light bulb, "I haven't failed 999 times, I've found 999 ways not to make the electric light bulb."

It might be worthwhile to take the time to discuss some of these behaviours a little more with your son. Try to come to some agreement about what exactly it would mean to 'Persist', or to 'Manage impulsivity', or even to 'respond with wonderment and awe'.

As you might gather, the College results from 2011 were at least as good overall as for 2010, a fact of which we should all be very proud. It was reassuring to see comment from Dr Karen Poutasi (CEO of NZQA) that only 30% of the Earthquake Impaired Derived Grades that schools submitted had to be applied at all for Christchurch students generally. In other words, across the earthquake-affected schools, in 70% of the external standards that students sat, they did at least as well as or better in the actual examinations than the grades submitted by schools would have indicated. An outstanding effort by staff and boys I think.

By the time you read this, your sons' external examination papers will have been returned to them by NZQA. If they feel that an error has been made in processing their result, they can apply for a 'Review', and if they think that there has been an error in the marking they can apply for a 'Reconsideration'. 100 YEARS OF THE SPORTS UNIFORM

The Christ's College Archives has four volumes of records which are known collectively as the Games Committee Minutes. They are almost continuous from 1862 – 1935 and reappear again from 1968 – 1979.


In the early days the minutes are not all about sports. Those who were elected to the Committee were responsible for a wide variety of matters ranging from running the library, appointing the cricket coach, deciding what races were to be run on Athletics days, fining boys for misdemeanours, organising the creation of Upper, raising money for Melanesian scholars, selecting candidates for the Ormsby Medal and arranging repairs on sheds and equipment. From time to time Headmasters and staff tried to exert their control over the committee, with varying degrees of success.

In March 1910 discussion began about the possibility of a blazer for the first XV It was raised again in March 1911 when it was suggested that it should be white with a black edging. This was to be in addition to the cap, badge, jersey and socks already provided for the team. Nothing ever happened about that particular proposal. However, it had been considered in the more general context of a blazer for the whole school.

In August 1912, Reginald James Richards, the chairman of the Games Committee and Head Prefect, who would later become College's 11th Headmaster, introduced the matter again. Nothing was definitely decided on 22 August. However, the following day Richards proposed, and John Loudon seconded, the motion, "that the use of a blazer should be extended to the whole school". The design of the blazer was then discussed and on the motion of Geoffrey Barnett, seconded by Alan Macfarlane, it was unanimously decided "the design of the blazer should be same as that at present used by the 2nd XI, with the exception that the '2' should be left off the pocket".

By the time the announcement was made in the December 1912 Christ's College Register, nearly half the school was wearing them. There is, however, one mystery still to be solved – when did the 2nd XI first wear the blazers? They are clearly being worn in the 1913 photograph of School House. No matter what the answer is – 1912 marks the year the sports uniform arrived for the whole school.
