

FROM THE HEADMASTER

You might not have been aware that **Heather Roy, former deputy leader of the ACT party**, held in her portfolio responsibility for independent schools. In that role she made herself widely available to the sector, and oversaw the roll-out of the government 'Aspire' scholarships and a modest funding increase. These were the realisation of pre-election support for our schools promised by the National Party. With the unanticipated economic downturn in the meantime, it was reassuring that this pledge was realised, albeit modestly. We would be naive to expect much more in the future, under current conditions and government cutbacks.

Heather Roy's relationship with the **Minister of Education**, **Anne Tolley**, crossed political and philosophical divides. Whilst it was reassuring to at least have an anchor for independent schools in government, the seabed has always been soft. Rather like any dragging anchor, you may not be aware you are drifting until you suddenly become aware of grinding noises, or a disappeared horizon. My expectation is our sector is likely to drift further out to sea in government priorities.

Meanwhile, the state teaching profession is once more going in the other direction and heading for rocks of confrontation. **Industrial action** is planned over pay and conditions claims, attributed by a union negotiator I recently heard on the subject to government ineptitude and disinterest in education. Whatever the position, damaging times are ahead. Our staff members are not members of the PPTA.

I referred to our ISNZ membership in the last 'In Black and White'. Recently issued **statistics for 2010** may be of interest:

In summary, the sector is contracting slightly in the current recession. Past experience would caution that this contraction tends to continue even when the economy is in recovery, as those who may once have been independent school families become used to alternatives. I am naturally pleased our roll continues to edge upwards, with no compromise in the quality of our entrants, in contrast to the national trend.



We are also members of the IBSC, the **International Boys' Schools Coalition**. This is the biggest organisation dedicated to the interests of boys' schools in the world. We are one of the participant schools in the latest research project, following their successful study of what makes for effective learning. This project looks at social structures and successful school cultures.

I have had a number of confused members of the school ask me about antelope. The species in question has a large white posterior, an affliction shared by some of our number whose shirts, apparently, have minds of their own. I hope the shop charges extra. I do worry though that living with an errant shirt is stressful for the boys – the shock of discovering their shirt has spontaneously rebelled again, is clearly distressing.

'In Black and White' has been very well received – thank you for your **feedback**. We will be developing further ways in which it is accessible. We have been discussing the future shape of College which will have the potential for more 'journalistic' pieces covering aspects of the wider community, to complement the records of, and features about, boys' activities. On the subject of our published material, those of you who travel with Air New Zealand will be familiar with Kia Ora magazine. In October each year we place an advertisement prior to our information evenings for the next year's entrants. Our last two have had an 'airport' theme, the first showing an aircraft apparently in the quad featuring 'boarding', and the second showed the baggage weighing machine screen with modified text. Look out for this year's – we hope you like it.

Each year we look critically at our **camp programmes** for Year 9, in Term 1, and Year 10 in Term 4. The 'base camp' arrangements work well, with catering and logistics all

covered, and outdoor specialists accompany all activities. In recent years, staff members to accompany some of the outdoor activities have been hard to find, and I would be delighted to hear from any enthusiastic parents who might like a night, or two, away under 'canvas'. We could arrange any part of the weeks involved, just one night or more to suit. These are great weeks – well organised and resourced, and a chance to be with boys en masse. They will be more than ready to upskill any parents interested in studying their habits in the wild. There are a whole range of activities available for parents to enjoy, who might have a little longer to spend with us. All activities contain a ham-string warning for those who may revert too carelessly to being 14 (from recent personal experience). It was pleasure to host the **British High Commissioner to New Zealand**, Mrs Vicki Treadell at College recently. We talked about matters of comparison between the UK education system, and that of New Zealand. I expressed the view that the UK had a lot to learn from us, not the other way round. A current controversy is about 'adjusting' A level statistics to ensure the expected number of students achieve the new A* grade at A level (Year 13, University Entrance requirements). The HMC (the Heads' organisation for independent schools) described the revelation as 'cryptic at best'. The 'objectivity' of precisely graded terminal examinations is once again showing itself to be fragile.

Finally, a potential problem for the Chaplain. A telephone contact was being given the College email address by my secretary to send us some information. As always, she helpfully emphasised the 's' in the middle of 'christscollege' because it is often omitted. 'Ah' said the caller, 'it's plural is it?'

Career Prospects during a recession -Some thoughts from Dr Ganesh Nana (BERL chief economist)

Dr Nana says the most important aspect of planning your career in a recession is to keep focussing on longer-term issues and not be diverted by the short-term focus.

Keep an eye on labour market information which indicates job areas that are growing or shrinking and what types of skills are in demand. There are definite skill shortages in NZ in very broadly defined areas such as: construction, engineering and science-related areas like biotechnology. In the longer term, issues like food production, climate change and land and resource use will create a range of opportunities.

CHARITY HOSPITAL

Dr Randall Allardyce joined Christ's College at Chapel last week and was presented with two cheques for the Canterbury Charity Hospital. Each cheque was the result of fundraising undertaken by College boys recently.

The 2010 Lent appeal raised a record total this year, half of which was directed towards the Haiti relief efforts earlier this term. The remaining \$8,897 was presented to Dr Allardyce by Deputy Head Boy, Alex Donaldson. These funds were raised by all ten of the College houses through sponsored team runs, work days and dances.

Head of the Chapel Choir, Elliott Botting then presented him with a further cheque for \$8000.00. This money was raised by the annual charity concert of the Chapel Choristers 'On a High Note'.

Dr Randall spoke to the congregation and reminded them that learning to be kind is done by observing and by doing. He said 'Once you see the results of your kindness you carry it on for the rest of your life. It makes a profound impact on your view of yourself, your role in your community and what goodness can actually accomplish.'

The Canterbury Charity Hospital provides day surgery treatment and medical treatment to people who have dropped off the public health waiting list, and who do not have the means to pay for medical treatment privately.

Dr Randall explained that 41% of the people treated at the charity hospital are able to fully participate in employment again following the treatment. "It is very, very important to realise that the relief of pain, the giving back of mobility, the return of sight to a patient has a profound effect not only on that patient but also on their family and it actually affects society as well" he said.

He also reminded boys of an earlier invitation to visit the Canterbury Charity Hospital and 'go into and out of the operating theatres vertically rather than horizontally' and thanked them and the College for their 'leadership in the teaching of kindness and their generosity of spirit'.

Organised and run by the Joshua Foundation, this day has been a part of the Year 12 Leadership programme for several years. The group was split into three and they spent two hours each at three different stations.

The first station involved a ropes course, the second was referred to as 'Leadership' where boys were given tasks to problem solve as a team, and the final station was the Confidence Course made famous by the 1980s show 'The Krypton Factor'. The NZ Army was responsible for teaching the boys the required skills to successfully negotiate the Confidence Course.

Housemasters present and the Deputy Headmaster, Mr Rob Donaldson were able to observe how the boys interact and work together and look for potential school leaders in 2011. The boys were able to gain insight into their own leadership styles and the responses of others.
