

FROM THE HEADMASTER

Welcome to the first *In Black & White* of 2011, and especially to our new parents. This is just one of the many communication avenues between us, and as you bring 'fresh eyes' to the College, any feedback is particularly welcome. It was good to see so many here as we welcomed our new entrants yesterday.

I was pleased to be elsewhere on Boxing Day, but the shakes continue. Our repair work at College to date has gone well, and further significant damage to the Cranmer Centre has been brought into our plans. The English block, the planned renovation of which was on schedule before September's event, may show little difference on the outside, but inside the scale of work is impressive; for the first time we can see the potential of the spectacular new stairwell – it will be a remarkable interior when all reinstated. The first half of the year is going to be difficult in terms of space, but it is a unique opportunity with obstacles to be overcome, and compromises to be made. Having been thrust unwillingly into a compressed programme of renovation, the benefits of this period of inconvenience will be long lasting.

NCEA discussion this year was triggered by Auckland Grammar School's assertion that NCEA does not suit 'boys' (that amorphous mass of undifferentiated masculinity so readily referred to in the media!) Fortunately Auckland's leafy highincome suburbs have enough schools, both state and private, for parents to be able to choose whether they want to buy into this meaningless assertion. There will be a larger number of our prestigious Gold Badges around the College in 2011. We are rightly proud of our position – we support the examination system the country has chosen, and are confident in our consistent demonstration of what it can achieve. As always, the assessment regime might mark out the pitch, but it has very little to do with the quality of play.

New Zealand is a unique place – we do not compete with the industrialised giants of the world in the processing of raw materials, our primary production is largely limited to agriculture, our economy is relatively small, and we



are determined to preserve our environmental quality. We have always developed our young people to service the professions, and we enjoy distinction in many academic fields. We also know our wealth creating future in commerce, is in adding value. I ask why we would take comfort from alignment with examination systems which serve overseas contexts which are irrelevant to ours? What we need are young people who have been intellectually prepared to invigorate New Zealand trade, manufacture, and commerce through initiative, self-motivation, persistence, efficient use of time, and planning, and who can achieve specific function related objectives. Of course, we want our young people to be thoroughly educated in the broadest sense; it is not all about functionality. We want them to know things, to have passions and interests, to be able to hold interesting conversations, to be self-assured, to work well with others, to be tenacious and persistent. New Zealand is a country which has to know what it is good at, and make sure it has an examination system which facilitates the development of the right attitudes and capabilities. If the system has flaws and weaknesses, we must fix them. What is essential is that the country 'owns it', and shapes it to our perhaps unique needs.

Whilst mentioning tenacity, resilience and resourcefulness, all are aware that our rowing season was heavily disrupted due to the earthquake, damage to our boatshed, and the pollution of the river. An accident returning from Twizel on Sunday, in which our boat trailer was blown over by a gust of wind, could not have come at a worse time. But we will recover, and most importantly there were no injuries to any of our rowing community.

As the term gets underway, let's look forward to another busy, successful and enjoyable year.

FILM REPORT – A Ist AD'S POINT OF VIEW

In Term 3 of 2009, a group of students from Christ's College and St Margaret's collaborated to write a film script. Nearly a year and a half later, the film has been shot and all that remains is for it to be edited, which will take place in Term 1 of 2011.

Named "The Sleeper", this film features Oliver, played by Oliver Robertson, a directionless teenager whose energies are focused entirely on his comatose father. He is led by mysterious messages to wake up and reconstruct his life, and is helped by a concerned fellow student, Hayley, played by Zasu Towle. Directed by Will Anderson and Charlotte Jackson, this film is going to be the most emotionally intense student film yet.

During the first week of the 2010 Christmas holidays we began tirelessly shooting the film. As very few of us had professional film experience, we were provided with as much assistance as we needed in the form of mentors from the industry. Most notable was Richard Bell, who has been with the production since we began writing. He was crucial in guiding our directors through the process of shooting a film and will now be assisting the editing team to get this film through the final hoops, before the premiere screening.

Shooting a film is not an experience many of us will forget. For two solid days, we practised and practised so that by the time we arrived at the real set location we would know exactly what to do. When we did arrive at St Margaret's to shoot the first scene it paid off as everything went to plan. The shooting schedule (which was so lovingly constructed and printed into over 60 production booklets) was adjusted almost instantly due to weather but, despite this, everything ran according to plan insofar as all the shots were completed and we now have all the material needed to begin pulling the film into a final product. It was an exhausting four days; many of the crew worked over 12 hours each day.

Films like this do not simply organise themselves, and people certainly do not just turn up to help without a certain amount of effort on the producer's part. As with all previous College and St Margaret's films Peter Hewson has bravely taken on this role, and has excelled in making this film a success so far. Whether it is providing equipment, people or advice, Mr Hewson is an invaluable part of this production.

I have been fortunate enough to be involved in all three major parts of production - writing, filming and soon editing - and so I have also been fortunate enough to witness the success that this film has been. Despite some communicative issues to begin with, all the students involved pulled together particularly well, turning up when required, and almost always doing as they were told. With a cast and crew of over 60 students and adults, directing them around a set location was always going to be a challenge. However, everyone behaved extremely professionally; something which was commented on frequently by all of the professional actors working with us, and was greatly appreciated by the directorial and production teams.

The film has been a huge success thus far, and is looking to be even more of a success once completed. It has been a fantastic opportunity for us to get some hands on experience in the film industry, and benefit from the vast knowledge and experience of our mentors. We have all enjoyed ourselves immensely.

VISITING AUTHOR - VIA VIDEO CONFERENCE

During Term 4 2010, Christ's College Year 9 English pupils had the opportunity to work with author Denis Wright via video conference, along with students from Burnside High, Riccarton High and Collingwood Area School. Denis Wright is the Year 9 Dean of Wellington High School and also author of the much-acclaimed book, *Violence 101*.

The session focused on creative writing, specifically the place of dialogue in a story. Mr Wright set the students the challenge of writing a half page of dialogue between two characters that set the scene, described the relationship and gave something of the plot without the writer's voice being evident.

Jeremy Penrose, Angus McKenzie and Brendan Chin were brave enough to read their work to the conference participants and receive feedback from Mr Wright. He spoke about the value of short sentences for creating drama and the power of family relationships for building tension. The students rounded-out their work by adding a few sentences of narrative.



TE AO MAORI - A GLIMPSE AT THE MAORI WORLD

The Te Ao Maori programme ran for Year 9 and 10 students during the final week of Term 4 2010. This programme focused on the instruction of Tikanga Maori (Maori culture) concluding with the Year 10 students confidently playing the role of the Tangata Whenua welcoming the Year 9 group as Manuhiri or honoured guests to the CPIT Marae. "It is extremely gratifying for all the staff who attended the concert to see the fruition of the determined practice maintained by the Year 10 boys who were absolutely brilliant as Taukana or elder brothers", says Mr Steve Everingham, Te Ao Maori Coordinator, "This is a factor that must benefit school leadership in the future."

Boys received instruction for two full days at College covering Te Reo and Tikanga Maori (language, protocol and culture) including Whakapapa and Mihi (self introductions and genealogy), Waiata and Himene (singing and hymns), Kapa Haka (dance and challenge), Ta Moko Toi (art and design). This culminated in the production of Purerehua, twirling devices in the shape of butterflies that are used to call people to attention at formal occasions and during battle. Other lessons included Mau Rakau and Taiaha (traditional martial arts) as well as Raranga (flax weaving).

Feedback from the supervising College staff mentioned the dignity, determination and respect brought to the classes run at College over the programme. "It is this talent to bring the best out of the boys in a different style of instruction involving group performance with oratory," says Mr Everingham, "that saw a very skilled and slick production by both year groups on the final day at the Marae."

Mr Everingham, on behalf of the College, would like to express the appreciation and thanks of the College to the CPIT Te Matauranga Maori Department staff and students, particularly to Chris Huata the administrator, for the outstanding teaching and hospitality received.

After a further test in March, a group of 24 will be invited to a training camp to be held in April. From there the New Zealand team will be selected to attend the 43rd International Chemistry Olympiad at Ankara, Turkey in 2011.

"These two boys have been studying hard over the holidays, learning all the Year 13 Chemistry course in this time. They will also have had assignments to do before the end of the holidays. Then they will be issued an assignment every couple of weeks to do running up to Easter - their performance in these determines if they are invited up to Auckland to take part in the final selection camp over the Easter holidays", says Mr List.

SETBACK FOR ROWING CLUB

The challenges keep coming in the 2010/2011 season for the Christ's College Rowing Club. Returning from the Meridian South Island Championship on Sunday afternoon, the boat trailer was flipped in an unexpected wind gust damaging some of the boats. While assessment is still to be completed it is thought that three of the 'eights' and two of the 'fours' have been written off.

"There has been a lot of support offered from rowing clubs and other schools," says Rowing Club Manager, Mr Chris Sellars. "When the other clubs finish their nationals in a couple of weeks a lot of boats will be freed up. The coaches have been amazed with what has been offered by others in the sport."

"We are extremely fortunate that no one was hurt," says Eugene Chang, the Rowing Club Parent Coordinator in a letter to the parents of College rowers. He offered the club's thanks to Tim Johnstone who was able to organise a crane on Sunday night to assist in turning the trailer back over.

A significant part of the early season was hampered by a lack of on-water training due to damage to the boatshed and water contamination following the Sept 4th earthquake. This year has seen two regattas, the Canterbury Championships and the South Island Club Championships abandoned because of the wind conditions before all finals could be raced.

However, Mr Sellars says that the boys remain extremely determined. "Now that they know that boats have been offered and will be available, they are going to all push on and train hard."

The South Island Secondary Schools' Championship regatta is on March 12-13 at Lake Ruataniwha and the 2011 Maadi Cup is being held at Lake Karapiro in Week 9 of this term.





UPDATE ON QUAKE REPAIRS

As the Headmaster welcomed the new Year 9 boys and their parents to the first Chapel Service of 2011 on Monday morning, the Quadrangle was looking remarkable tidy and quiet. This was in contrast to the activity of the past few weeks in which Naylor Love and contracted painters, slaters and glaziers, along with College maintainence staff, were working hard to get the school ready for the new year. The slate repairs on the cloisters of Harper/Julius and School House were completed over the weekend and the last of the scaffolding, ever-present since September 4th, was removed on Sunday.

Significant work continues on the refurbishment of the Chapman and English block, scheduled for 2011 regardless of the September 4th earthquake. Work also continues at the Cranmer Centre to repair and strengthen the building with the expectation to return those classrooms to use later in 2011.

As with other repair work around the province, the Boxing Day quake was a set-back. Areas in the school that had already been plastered and painted needed to be returned to by contractors and more glazing work was required. Maintainence Manager, Mr Mike Tovey, says that, while this was a frustration, the Boxing Day aftershocks did not significantly alter the overall repair programme.

"The gables of the older buildings has been the area of most noticeable damage in a number of buildings, where Oamaru stone, gable cap stones and high brick or stone work needed lowered following the initial quake. This same problem occured again to a lesser extent on other gables that hadn't been damaged in the first major quake," explains Mr Tovey. "However, it has been gratifying to see that wherever major repair work has been completed since September 4th no new damage reoccurred."
