From the Headmaster

Last weekend, we enjoyed the biggest ever reunion of our Old Boys. To the usual mix of decade reunions of twenty to seventy years (alumni now in their early thirties to early eighties), we welcomed Mr Richard Harding at 93 years old (who joined the school 80 years ago



in 1934.) Two further reunions for those 65 and 75 years after joining the school, swelled the numbers, including a wonderful turn-out in Chapel on Sunday night. The Presidency of the CCOBA has passed to Ben Walker, as Johnny Cochrane came to the end of his tenure which saw further energetic progress in developing support for the work of the College. The CCOBA secretary Justine Nicholl managed to remain charmingly calm throughout the weekend, despite a number who apparently were as well organised in the booking processes as they probably were getting their homework in on time. We value the support of our alumni enormously, and what was particularly heartening this weekend was the number who offered their professional experience and opportunities in a number of ways.

They were all impressed with our building project, which is at a stage where the framing pillars of the third and final building are in place. We now have a feel for the scale of the whole development, and how stunning the 'inner courtyard' behind the library is going to be. At this point we are on track for the term 4 completion, and thoughts are turning to the 'official' opening, probably at the start of 2015.

Building progress is partly weather dependent, though the phases where this is usually critical are behind us. This sadly could not be said for our athletics sports day, which after a spectacular 'big Monday' and beautiful Thursday afternoon, was rained off at lunchtime on Friday. Mindful of what was a firm weather forecast, some early schedule decisions by the organising staff enabled all but the relays to be completed, and these will be caught up this week. The organisation of this event is meticulously managed, and each year new aspects are added. This year it was some additional groundsmanship (and imported equipment) by Taylor 'rotary ride-on' Budge, and Frazer 'Roller-man' Densem who contributed to the look of the field, captured from the top of the new building. As the rain came down, the multiple high-tech systems had to be recovered in very unpleasant conditions, and Henry Seed, Ross Shillito, Carter Neal, Chris Bannock and Bramley Maclean deserve a mention. Baptism is now better understood as full membership of the church – with all its rights and commitments. Baptism does not make you a member of a particular denomination – mainline denominations accept each other's baptism. As this is entry into the church, you can receive communion at Christ's College and any other Anglican Church, and any denomination that allows all the baptised to receive communion. If your son is getting confirmed, he will need to be baptised.

University of Canterbury

New University Entrance requirement

From 2014, students will need all of the following to be awarded University Entrance.

- attain NCEA Level 3
- achieve 14 credits at Level 3 in each of three subjects from the approved list of subjects.
- achieve UE numeracy 10 credits at Level 1 and above from specific achievement standards, or three specific numeracy unit standards.
- achieve UE literacy 10 credits (five in reading and five in writing) at Level 2 and above from specific standards.

Blue Light Programme - Life skills programme

New Zealand Blue Light is a registered charity and community policing programme which has run programmes and activities for young people free from drugs, alcohol and violence for the past 30 years. 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Curriculum News



The Education Review Office regularly publishes the results of its research into what is happening in New Zealand schools, and in particular what it sees as important characteristics of successful schools. One of the more recent publications confirmed what we have long known; successful schools engage parents in the education process. For College that has always included

your ability as parents to see your son's prep and at times to discuss this with them.

Over the past year and a half College has trialled a web based Prep app and in 2014 all boys' prep is set by teachers using this app. When boys log into the College Intranet they are presented with their school timetable, with links to online resources. When a teacher sets prep the subject title changes to red. This gives an easy indicator for the boys about the subjects for which they have prep.

When the boys click on the subject they are presented with the details of the prep and an indication of when it is due. If they have completed the prep, they click the 'Done' box. The classroom teacher can see who has read the prep and who has ticked the 'Done' box.

As parents you should feel free to get boys to show what prep they have via the internet. You can see the prep that has been set over a period of time by clicking on the Prep History button. Over the past few weeks I have been visiting classrooms to get a better feel for how the new laptop programme is unfolding. It is fascinating. Uses are varied, as staff and boys develop confidence in using the technology. Innovative applications like 'Thinglink' are being used alongside more traditional software like Google Docs and Word. The Intranet is being used for traditional content management and delivery at one end of the spectrum, and co-creation of knowledge using such tools as Google Forms at the other.

Learning in this laptop environment is a matter of using the right tool for the job (as it has always been). Educationalists describe this as a 'blended learning' environment. They mean in particular the combination of face to face and online learning, but we could possibly extend that meaning to include use of pen and paper and electronic media. I have been reassured to see boys using good old fashioned pen and paper alongside their laptops. The art of handwriting will continue to be important for the foreseeable future, particularly in the context of NZQA assessment. In my own classes for example, boys develop writing skills electronically, and then transition to writing on paper in preparation for their external examinations. Courses, classes and teachers will continue to emphasise the use of pen and paper.

Film Production Underway

Groups of students from Christ's College and St Margaret's College have been busy working on their next film, *Connected*. Written by students, headed by Amazir Aknine and Meghan Laing, the film is about a history student who, as part of his research into early 20th Century photography, stumbles on to a girl from the period he is researching on an online chat room. His friends are all obsessed with the technology of cell phones, Facebook, Twitter etc. and he thinks they are playing a practical joke on him. When he discovers the girl online is actually from 1911 and is ill, he has to make a vital choice about whether he can save her.

This is the sixth film produced for the two schools by HOD Media Studies at Christ's College, Peter Hewson. "The students have great fun doing these projects," he says "as they learn a great deal about the process involved in film-making and the skills they need." Adult mentors from the film and television industry help guide the students through the process which has been underway since Term 3 last year. The script has been written, production meetings are happening, the cast auditioned and chosen and key crew members selected to help produce the film. Shooting will be during the first week of the April holidays at various locations around Christchurch and next term the important post-production roles of editing, music composition and mixing will occur.

The first known photograph of Black and White

I always thought I knew the story of how and why Christ's College has black and white for its uniform, but after reading Jeremy Sutherland's (9243) book *Green and Black* there is a twist in the tale.

In the beginning there was no uniform at all, boys just wore their everyday clothes. If you were under thirteen then you wore boots on your feet, long socks to your knees or the hem of your knickerbockers, braces to hold them up over a long-sleeved shirt with a broad Eton collar and a tie and a jacket. If you were over thirteen your trousers stretched down to the tops of your boots and were held up with slightly longer braces. A longsleeved shirt with a detachable collar and tie was covered with a waistcoat that often sported a fob watch, while a jacket and sometimes a hat completed the outfit.

Playing a sports team meant you were among the first to have a recognisable uniform. In the 1850's and 1860's the 1st XV and the 1st XI wore variations of blue and white, while the caps distinguished the teams. Initially cricket had blue caps and later added white lines to distinguish them from the 1st XV, while later the whole 22 of football had blue caps with red lines. However, on 9 April 1874, the Games Committee Minute Book records the resolution of Robert Heaton Rhodes, the captain of the 1st XV, "That black and white be the uniform". Rugby subsequently had a close call with cerise and grey in 1878, but that was cancelled when the requested colours could not be supplied from Australia.

But where did the colours come from? In the April 1913 *College Register* there is an article by Edward Rogers Webb (722, at College 1877-1884). He wrote that "On asking Mr Rhodes the reason for their choice of colours, he tells me that they were the colours of the McKenzie (sic) Country team, which had been seen by some of the Committee, who were so struck with their appearance that the above resolution was passed".

But there is a different version. Jeremy Sutherland suggests that the colours of the MacKenzie Country team came from Christ's College because many of the sons of the local farmers came home for the holidays wore their College rugby "togs" to play in. However the MacKenzie team did not begin until about 1875, about a year later than College's Games Committee resolution.

There is an additional clue in Jeremy Sutherland's other book *Leather and Tussock*. On page 263 there is a photograph of the 1870 Burkes Pass Cricket team resplendent in their black and white caps. On 22 October 1873 the Christ's College 1st XI played the Burkes Pass cricket team and who was the Captain? – none other than Robert Heaton Rhodes, son of George Rhodes of Timaru!

Jeremy Sutherland poses another question in a recent email – could there be a connection between Dr FJ Kimbell (whose sons came to College in the 1880's) and his hosting of the Burke's Pass cricket aftermatch functions? The colours of his coat of arms are none other than black and white.

So Christ's College's colours are black and white – there can be no doubt about that, but how they came to be black and white is maybe not so black and white after all?
