



Boarding Matters

Over the last fortnight, I have spent time in the evenings visiting the three College Boarding Houses. While I already know many of the boys, it has given me a good opportunity to find out a bit more about them and to get to know some of the newer boys at all year levels.

I also took the time to discuss House culture and leadership with the Year 13s, and find out their views on these areas. I emphasised how they can all be leaders in the House, not just in their roles as House Prefects when on duty, but also, more importantly, in the way they relate to the junior members of the House in everyday life. We talked about them spending time to get to know the juniors and to work alongside them in a mentoring capacity. I also reminded them they should never underestimate their influence as role models and how their behaviour can affect the younger members of the House. Our House cultures are areas we must continue to work on – and this will be a focus for House staff throughout the year. As someone recently said to me, policies are easy to change, culture takes time.

In terms of leadership, I believe it is not always about having a title, it can also be about having an idea and running with it. A perfect example of this was the evening I was in Flower's House, where I was fortunate to be invited to partake in a dumpling supper prepared by international students Frank Shi and Mark Ma (click here to view full story). The dumplings were delicious, thoroughly enjoyed by everyone, and it was a chance for the boys to work together and gain some insight into another culture. It was an excellent example of some boys utilising their strengths to benefit others in the House – and not just in terms of filling their stomachs!



Finally, I would like to invite all boarding parents to **Boarding at Christ's College – 2017 and Beyond** on **Sunday 30 April**, from **5pm**. This is the Sunday at the end of the April school holidays, when you will be returning your sons to College for the start of Term 2. From the Archives: The Blue Book

In 2017 we acquire information about College life and expectations from a range of sources and most of them are available digitally. The September 1913 version of this information was found in the Blue Book, introduced by the then Headmaster, Ernest Belcher.

The copy illustrated here belonged to "R H Ballantyne terts", which translates as Ronald Haynes Ballantyne, the third boy with the surname Ballantyne at Christ's College at that time. It did not matter whether the boys belonged to the same family or not, if they had the same surname they were numbered from one onwards and these numbers changed as boys left College. R H Ballantyne would thus become Ballantyne minor in 1915 and then Ballantyne major in 1917.

It is an intriging volume, obviously prepared for the beginning of the first term in 1914, and contains information that is no longer publicly available, including staff addresses and a list of the boys at College with their forms and dates of birth. At that time, there were 15 form classes and the School List indicates there was a total roll of 302 boys.

The calendar includes swimming sports in mid February, Masters' meetings, Chapel services, including a confirmation, and neverending report writing. A cadet camp is squeezed in at the end of March, as well as an inspection by General Ian Hamilton on 2 May. Bathing hours were clearly separated between Town Houses, the Lower School and Old Boys, with boys in the Boarding Houses expected to be early swimmers, as one of their allocated times was 6.30–7am every day.

The page headed "Sets 1914" indicates the Third, Fourth and Fifth Forms (Years 9–11) were divided into four sets for mathematics, French and science – and we know from other sources that this enabled boys to be taught at the level that was appropriate for them. It also provides information about the workload of various staff. A E Flower was responsible for five science sets and one mathematics set spread across the whole range of forms, while F L Carter, J Monteath and H Hudson taught the 10 French sets between them.

It is also a book produced on the cusp of war. Two of the staff would be killed (Horace Lang and Guy Spencer Bryan-Brown), as well as the Head Prefect and Head of Flower's House (Ralph Edward Fulton Barnett) and the Head of South Town (David Allan Neill Kennedy Mackenzie). The Head of School House, Walter Wootton Averill, served as a Captain in the 7th Reinforcements and William Strachan Chambers Harris, Head of North Town, was a corporal in the 16th New Zealand Field Artillery. Another member of staff, Charles Le Fanu Young would die later from the effects of gas poisoning, while Edward Herbert Severne was discharged on medical grounds (shell shock).

Rules of Bounds on page 36, and the map attached to the back cover, show very clearly exactly what the expectations of College were in respect to access to wider Christchurch. This access has varied over the years. "All places of entertainment and all hotels" in 1913–14 were extended to include inns, bars, milk bars, coffee bars and lounges, dance halls and cafes in the 1960s. By 1979 it was up to the Headmaster to "from time to time declare any place or places within the area of Christchurch or any part or parts of the School precincts to be out of bounds to all or any members of the School". In the latest revision of the School Rules, in 2017, it is the

Day boys are to observe the same rule, except that they may go to or from their homes by the direct road.

5. Between morning and evening Chapel on Sundays, the Museum, Hagley Park and the Gardens are in Bounds, but all boarders must go via the Football Field. Between the services on Sundays, day boys have general leave out of Bounds. 6. All places of entertainment and all hotels are out of Bounds

6. All places of entertainment and all hotels are out of Bounds at all times. Boys should pay special attention to those streets in town which at certain times are in Bounds. Boarders going into town will always proceed via Gloucester Street or Cashel Street. Day boys will go by the nearest road to and from their homes. Lower School boarders will go via Armagh Street.

7. In the third term of each year, when "lock-up" is later than 4 p.m., Hagley Park is in Bounds for the purpose of training for the races on whole school days between 4 and "lock-up."
8. School Prefects are exempt from Bounds, but not from the rules after "lock-up."

Deputy Principal who may "from time to time declare any place or activity to be out of bounds to all or any members of the school". This is followed by clarification of the extent of the College campus, exceptions to the rule and places within the campus which are out of bounds for specific reasons and times.

It is to be hoped R H Ballantyne terts confined himself to the areas designated by the Map of Bounds and that he went by the nearest road to and from home.
