From the Executive Principal

I have just returned from the 25th Annual Conference of <u>Independent Schools New Zealand</u> (ISNZ). Serving the needs of governance, leadership, and teaching and learning in independent schools in New Zealand is the purpose of this organisation.

In the changing landscape of what education means to this country, ISNZ works to ensure the voice of independent schools is heard by politicians and policy makers. Given the very small number of independent schools in New Zealand, this is a difficult task and it was with this in mind that ISNZ CEO Ms Deborah James, when the opportunity presented, challenged the newly-appointed Minister of Education, Ms Nikki Kaye, regarding the need for the government to better support independent schools. There is ongoing discrimination against independent schools, with no increase in government funding for many years, despite the significant contribution these schools make to the education sector. After 25 years, ISNZ is looking forward to new ways in which it will work in its members' interests.

The theme of the conference "Eudaimonia – Educational Wellbeing" was most apposite given College's strategic plan. As I trust you are aware, College has been considering its strategic direction to 2020, and I share with you <u>here</u> our current focus. This document outlines our most significant priorities, provides a clear statement of our vision and mission and outlines the ideal character attributes of the College graduate. I would appreciate your feedback on this overarching framework prior to specific projects being established and appropriate performance measures put in place that will naturally generate out of our intent.

The past few weeks have highlighted for me that we must be cognizant of two fundamental matters when dealing with young people who can be described as "adolescent". Firstly, they will inevitably make errors of judgement and mistakes, or be led to unusual circumstances by their peer group or the influence of social media.



Secondly, such matters as I have just described, must be seen as "teachable moments" – circumstances in which the best outcome is a conversation and consideration of the associated issues. It is the responsibility of adults and institutions to model that which we would wish for in our young people and often this is in the way we deal with difficulties. We must focus at all times on building quality relationships through addressing matters of concern in a constructive, open and honest way, rather than slipping immediately to the punitive as a solution.

The most thought-provoking lesson I took from the ISNZ conference was that quality of relationships can have a significant impact on whether or not an individual enjoys a long and happy life. In schools, helping young people develop the emotional intelligence and communication skills that lead to quality relationships is perhaps the most important of all the things we do – and often these skills are learnt in those particularly memorable teachable moments.


Website refresh

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From the Chaplain

Rev. Andrew Starky RIP



Many of you would have seen reports of the death of Old Boy Rev. Andrew Starky, and some of you were present at his funeral. Andrew was vicar of St Michael

and All Angels, a church with which we have a special relationship - it was the site of Christ's College before the school settled in its present location. Andrew was a regular preacher in our Chapel who was welcomed by the students. His wisdom and friendship will be sorely missed.

In Chapel

We began the term with our Anzac service, remembering war in our increasingly tinder-box world, the need for us to glorify peace, how we can honour those who served and died best by battling the prejudices in our own hearts, and by working for peace and justice and reconciliation.

On Wednesday evening, we inducted new members into the Chapel Choir and also acknowledged the leadership in the Choir. We are now in the 50-day Easter Season, which equals one seventh of the year. This time of reflection is like the Sunday of our year, Sunday being one seventh of a week.

As many of you will know, it is 500 years since the beginning of the Reformation. In Year 11 Religious Education, which builds on introductory material from other years, the programme includes an overview of 2,000 years of Western and Church history. Many of our weekday Chapel services this year will complement this study by looking at individuals and moments from these 2,000 years and considering how we might apply lessons learnt in our personal lives.

In the Classroom

In Year 9 we have just started looking at the Bronze Age in the Fertile Crescent, beginning with Abraham and Sarah. The stories and insights gained have strong connections with our lives. Year 10 students continue to learn about different world religions, which is essential to living together in our diverse country and in our global-village world. Year 11 has begun looking into different ways to make ethical decisions. These lessons introduce students to several ethical theories that can be applied in increasingly complex debates.

It was wonderful to speak to so many of you at the parent interview evenings.

Boarding Matters

It was great to see so many boarding parents at the presentation "Boarding at Christ's College – 2017 and beyond". I trust the evening was informative and beneficial in terms of highlighting where College has been in boarding, where we are now, and where we want to go in the future.

I want to reiterate that the future in boarding is a three-way partnership between College, parents and students. On reflection, the evening ended up being more than just an information evening, as it was also an opportunity for parents across all three Houses to catch up in a social setting and I could see there were some good conversations taking place. I hope everyone also enjoyed the meal and the opportunity to see the renovations to the Dining Hall. Any feedback on the presentation will be gratefully received. The evening was filmed, and I will arrange for the video and PowerPoint presentation to be sent to all boarding parents over the next week.

As mentioned in the presentation, the focus in Term 2 will be on creating a cohesive and consistent discipline model, as well as taking the first steps in implementing a new electronic leave system. We will also continue to educate the boys in different areas and aspects of behaviour, to ensure they can make good choices and develop into fine young men. This term we will focus on appropriate use of technology and understanding of different cultures.

Last night I met with boarders and boarding staff to outline our plans for the term. College Counsellor and Director of Wellbeing & Positive Education, John Quinn, also came along. John spoke briefly about appropriate use of technology, the Executive Principal's email to parents about the Netflix series 13 Reasons Why, and consent. He was very clear with the boys in terms of what is right and what is wrong. Later in the term our International Student Manager, Deanne Gath, will lead a session designed to give the boys insight into and greater understanding of different cultures. This is not only important because we are seeing an increase in numbers of international students at Christ's College, but also because it is an essential life skill. New Zealand is a small country in a very big world, and knowledge and understanding of different cultures will serve our boys well when they head out into that world.

Part of the long-term boarding plan is to have a cohesive and integrated Boarding Curriculum that will provide boarding students with more comprehensive opportunities. It is important the boys enjoy their boarding experience, but we must always keep in mind they are being educated and prepared for life after College.

Taking his place in College history



With the last of the earthquake repairs and restoration complete, it is time for College to focus on the next stage in its development – and the person steering that work forward is new Director of Finance and Operations and Board Secretary Steve Kelsen.

Steve joined College in 2012, to help manage insurance claims and provide strategic financial support. "When Colin [former Bursar Colin Sweetman] interviewed me he mentioned his retirement and the potential for my role to expand. Of course I was interested, it was a wonderful opportunity." He describes working alongside Colin as a four-year apprenticeship. "He was very generous with his time and advice, and remarkably good at involving me in those things that enabled a smooth transition."

Steve says his role is to enact the vision set by the Board of Governors and College Executive. "College is a school with a long history and strong traditions, yet it's also focused on the future, on the best in teaching and learning, and on producing young men of good character. I like working in an organisation that has values which are aligned with my own."

Originally from Hawera, Steve left Taranaki when he joined up. Selected for officer cadet training, he spent nine years working in the Air Force and, at the same time, completed a Bachelor of Commerce and Diploma in Humanities at the University of Canterbury. Commerce gave him the foundation for his wide-ranging professional experience – first with the Air Force, then in both the public and private sectors, including a stint running Hot Mamas cafe in Motueka – but it was studying classics that sparked his longstanding passion for archaeology.

For several years Steve led a peripatetic lifestyle, focusing on his career in Wellington – including roles in governance and management at Te Aho o Te Kura Pounamu | The Correspondence School and in school support for the Ministry of Education – but then taking off to work on archaeological digs in the Middle East. "I had a flat in the Old City of Jerusalem, built in Suleiman the Magnificent's time [early 1500s], but when the digs were going on lived on site."

Steve worked on two sites, one near the Galilee and the other close to Gaza. "The village near Gaza was built on a strategic route from Egypt to Jerusalem, earliest occupation Neolithic, latest during the 1973 Yom Kippur war. The dig encompassed Neolithic, early and late Bronze Age, Iron I and Iron II, Persian, Roman, Crusader, Ottoman and modern Israeli ... the detritus of history spanning the ages. It was fascinating."

One day, Steve plans to go back. But for now he is happy to be settled in Christchurch with his wife, Emma, and two young daughters, proud to be working at College, and active in the community through his work for the charity and governance boards of South Island Freemasons.

From the Archives: The 1906–1907 prospectus

College Archives has two copies of the 1906– 1907 prospectus, and they are both very dirty. Because they were in the archives before an archivist was appointed there are no clues about their origin, but they do provide many clues about life at College 110 years ago.

There was, of course, a Headmaster (Rev. Christopher <u>Hudson</u> Moreland) and a Chaplain (Rev. Francis Augustus Hare), but the staff only numbered 13. They were expected to teach Divinity, Latin, English, French and Mathematics. Latin could be replaced in the higher forms by Greek or German, while Chemistry and Heat were also added at that level. Sometimes Latin could be replaced by Bookkeeping and extra Mathematics or English, while singing and drawing were taught in the lower forms.

Boys were encouraged to join the choir, and instrumental music was taught outside school hours for an additional fee. Extra tuition in drawing and bookkeeping was free, but carpentry cost 5/- per term.

Cricket, football (rugby), fives, swimming and athletics were all part of the College sports calendar and, "Attendance at Cricket and Football on half holidays is required of all boarders, and strongly recommended for day boys, both in their own interest and for the promotion of public spirit". Wednesday was a half holiday, as College hours on that day, and on Saturday, were 9.15am–12.45pm. On Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday everyone was expected to be in attendance from 9.15am–12 noon and 1.40–3.40pm. In addition, there was a chapel service each weekday morning at 8.30am.


The library – "to which new books are constantly added" – was well established, along with a Cadet Corps. Gymnastics and drill were compulsory for all. A note in italics states, *"All Boys must wear the school hat or school cap"*. This is not surprising, as the College uniform was not yet formally established.


Somes Scholarships and Exhibitions were granted as a result of examinations in Latin, English, Mathematics and French with Greek or German, or Science, or Geography and English History. Music Scholarships were also available and they came with a commitment to the Cathedral Choir. The prospectus points out scholarships were arranged so that it was possible to obtain them in succession, which meant the whole of an individual's time at College could be covered.

Named prizes that are still a part of prize-giving were awarded, including Tancred prizes for History and English Literature, the Balfour Divinity prize and Tyndale prizes for Religious Education. Prizes were also awarded for Ancient and Modern Languages, Mathematics and Science.

There are two pages of photographs included in the prospectus, and only two buildings are unfamiliar. The second boarding house has been replaced by School House and the Headmaster's House has been replaced, over time, by Jacobs House, Richards House and the Old Boys' Theatre.
