### From the Executive Principal

This week boys in Years 9 and 10 have left the College campus to take part in a variety of educational experiences outside of the classroom. Each of these programmes look to develop the character of our boys in environments and activities that anticipate cooperation and collaboration.

Around half of our Year 10 students are focusing on community service, as they have completed their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh's Hillary Award adventurous journey during the Immerse & Inspire programme. The balance of our Year 10 boys are now at Boyle River Lodge to complete their Bronze Award adventurous journey. This reflects the fact that all Year 10 students are now enrolled in the Duke of Edinburgh's Hillary Award, which provides young people with a framework for personal discovery and growth through a programme of voluntary activities. I hope many boys will take the initiative to complete the next levels of the Duke of Edinburgh's Hillary Award while at College, as such engagement can be very rewarding. A community service week will be cemented as an experience for all Year 10 boys next year. As part of our strategic plan, our membership of Round Square requires a greater expectation of service from the boys

for the community at large. This year, it has been wonderful to see collaboration with Hohepa Homes, the Lyttelton Port Company, the Banks Peninsula Conservation Trust, Orana Wildlife Trust and the Christchurch City Mission.

Our Year 9 students are taking part in a camping experience and general activities based in and around Christchurch and Banks Peninsula.

All this activity has been coordinated by Mr Graeme Christey and Mr Neil Porter, and involves all academic staff at some point – with some tramping and camping out overnight, and others accompanying boys in service-based activities. Such programmes could not exist without the goodwill and full engagement of staff and I would like to thank them and acknowledge their work on behalf of the boys and College.

### Centre for Ethics & Spirituality

I am delighted Director of Finance and Operations Mr Steve Kelsen has agreed to present on "Israelites in Archaeology and the Bible" for the Centre for Ethics & Spirituality – and recommend you mark this event in your calendars now.

Steve is passionate about archaeology and has first-hand experience in the Middle East, having worked as a volunteer and supervisor of archaeological excavations at Tel Rehov and Tel Zeitah.

From its Neolithic beginning, Tel Rehov grew to be a major city during the period of the United Monarchy and may have been the home of the Prophet Elisha. Tel Zeitah (probably the site of the biblical city of Libnah, mentioned in Joshua 10:32 and 2 Kings 19:8) has been a border town between the Egyptian and Philistine coast and the hill country of Judah from the Late Bronze Age until the 1967 Six Day War. Tel Zeitah was also where (possibly) the earliest piece of proto-Hebrew writing was found.

While there, Steve worked for some of the luminaries of Near Eastern Archaeology, such as Amihai Mazar and Gabriel Barkay, as well as mavericks such as Egon Lass. He also lived and worked in the Old City of Jerusalem during the Second Intifada (Palestinian Uprising).

Steve will discuss what archaeology can tell us about the Bible (particularly in the Iron Age/Israelite Period), being part of a dig, and living and working as an archaeologist in Israel.

## **Curriculum News**

Our mission at Christ's College is to provide an environment in which each boy can be at his best, wrapped under the korowai of innovation and tradition. This mission is also summed up by an old whakatauki: Ma te ahurei o te rangatahi, ka arahi i o matou mahi – Let the uniqueness of the student guide our work.

From an academic perspective this aspirational mission statement is about being a leading teaching and learning institution, and offering our boys the finest education. This commitment guides us in all areas of the school's academic operations, underpinning our pedagogy, programmes and procedures.

In order for each boy to be at his best, we seek to cultivate a love of learning amongst our students; a disposition towards learning that is characterised by creativity and curiosity. Of equal value, however, is the development of work ethic and personal responsibility. No matter what field our boys choose to pursue in order to reach their personal best, they will need to develop a strong work ethic and an ambition to succeed. Bobby Knight, a successful basketball coach, points out many people have the will to win, but few have the will to prepare to win. In order for us to develop this ambition, we need to ensure our boys understand what success looks like for them. This year we concluded a curriculum review and, as part of this review, created the Centre for Teaching Excellence & Research. The four Heads of Teaching & Learning – Dr Graeme Swanson, Ms Katie Southworth, Ms Nicole Billante, Mr Warren Lidstone - and I will be working to support and empower our teaching staff to be the best they can be. I am firmly of the belief that our teachers are driven by an intrinsic motivation to develop our boys to be at their best, to work towards something greater than ourselves. As teaching staff we want to build on the legacy of this fine school but, as the great Athenian statesman Pericles pointed out, legacy is not what is written in stone, rather what is woven into the lives of others.

## **Boarding Matters**

## At this time, I believe it is appropriate to reflect on the year that was, as well as look ahead to 2018.

I am pleased we have many positive events to remember and much progress made in boarding in 2017, including:

- Another busy year of Boarding Programme activities.
- An increased expectation in terms of our duty of care, with extra staff – such as non-residential tutors, academic tutors, and a Gymnasium and Weights Room supervisor – all adding value to the boarding experience.
- Professional development opportunities for staff for example, the New Zealand Boarding Schools' Association conference and the Boarding Duty of Care course run by the Australian Boarding Schools Association and hosted by Christ's College.
- Inspirational evening sessions for the boys including Australian adventurer Jeremy Scott talking about overcoming adversity, perseverance, determination, self belief and the importance of learning from mistakes; and College Old Boys Tomo Harada (Jacobs House 2003–2007) and Andrew Mills (Jacobs House 2005–2007) speaking about life as a boarder back in the noughties and the need to make an effort to understand the backgrounds of fellow boarders.
- The increased student voice listening to the boys' ideas and their constructive comments to help improve the boarding experience.

The recent MMG survey, completed by students and parents of Years 10, 12 and 13 boys, confirmed boarding is heading in the right direction. It is also nice to report numbers have increased for 2018, with 31 Year 9 boarders set to start at the beginning of next year. This is a significant step up from recent years, and we look forward to welcoming these boys and their families to our community.

The survey also provided some valuable feedback with regard to areas needing further work. Therefore, in 2018, our main focus will be on:

- Further developing the student voice. The goal planning programme will be introduced across all Houses; vertical tutor groups within each boarding House will provide opportunities to develop positive relationships between senior and junior boys; connections within and across the three boarding Houses will be enhanced with inter and intra House activities and competitions as we all know boys thrive when a little bit of competition is thrown in!
- Further alignment of the three boarding Houses in areas such as discipline and leave. We have made good progress, but this still requires further tweaks in 2018.
- Developing our boarding curriculum in terms of the support we provide for our boarders to help them fulfil their potential and develop into good young men making responsible choices. This will complement work being done across the school in this area.

With my Character & Leadership hat on, I am thrilled with how our Immerse & Inspire trials went this year, and look forward to rolling this programme out to all Year 10 students in 2018. Both the boys involved and their parents gave invaluable feedback. I also look forward to being involved in the Years 9, 10 and 11 Health and Wellbeing programmes, as well as the MANifesto programme for Years 12 and 13. A busy but exciting year awaits ...

#### **Boarding Programme**

The Boarding Programme for 2017 will come to a conclusion this weekend, with paintball and surfing taking place. The recent highlight was the boarders having the opportunity to sail around Lyttelton Harbour on the Fox II (New Zealand's oldest gaffed rigged ketch).

### From the Archives: Prize Collection enhanced

The Prize Collection within the College Archives was enhanced recently with the addition of a number of Weston family prizes, donated by T Shailer Weston (5163).

The volume that caught my eye was Beeton's Dictionary of Geography – A Universal Gazetteer, Comprising Upwards of Twelve Thousand Distinct Articles and Illustrated by Many Maps and Several Hundred Engravings. First published in 1868, this edition was awarded to Thomas Shailer Weston (960) in 1883 for English in the Upper 5th Form.

Thomas Shailer Weston came to College as a Government Scholar in 1881 and left in 1885 as Head Prefect and Academic Head of School. He went on to have a distinguished career in law, and this was just one of the many prizes he was awarded during his time at College.

New Zealand is one of the "distinct articles" in this edition of the Dictionary of Geography, and is described as the collective name of three islands in the South Pacific Ocean, first discovered by Tasman, and now a colonial possession of Great Britain, 1200 miles SE of Australia. The climate was, "Healthy; snow rarely falls but gales and heavy rains are frequent; there is, however, no rainy season". Birds have "a melodious voice and a beautiful appearance" and "every creek swarms with different kinds of fish, cravfish, cockles, and rock oysters, which not [only] afford wholesome food, but are quite as delicious as those of Europe". Unfortunately, Christchurch does not get a mention.

The name Beeton will be familiar to many with respect to Mrs Beeton's Book of Household Management, which was first published in monthly parts in 1859 and then as a complete volume in 1861. Mrs Isabella Mary Beeton (nee Mayson) married Samuel Orchart Beeton in 1856. Kathryn Hughes, in her biography The Short Life and Long Times of Mrs Beeton, charts their life together, both personally and through their collaborations in publishing. Beeton published a large number of books and magazines. This particular volume, completed after Isabella's death in 1865, highlights Samuel Beeton's own interests, as he was a Fellow of the Geographical Society from 1860-1870.
