While we come to terms with the anger, distress, fear and confusion we feel, it is vital that we acknowledge the good in others - the courage, hope, care and compassion of so many people who witnessed and responded to this terrorist outrage in our city.

Friday's attack goes against everything we hold dear at College and, now more than ever, it is important to focus on our core Christian virtues and character strengths we believe will help our young men flourish in what can, at times, seem like a very bleak world.

Trauma can manifest in many different ways and affect anyone, whether directly involved or not. We must look out for and look after, encourage and support each other, and

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A message from Head Prefect Zach Gallagher



Lord, make us instruments of your peace where there is hatred, let us sow love where there is injury, pardon where there is discord, union where there is doubt, faith where there is despair, hope where there is darkness, light where there is sadness, joy.

"Our uniqueness, our individuality, and our life experience, molds us into fascinating beings. I hope we can embrace that. I pray we all challenge ourselves to delve into the deepest resources of our hearts, to cultivate an atmosphere of understanding, acceptance, tolerance, and compassion. We are all in this life together."

Unfortunately, the words of American actress Linda Thompson were ignored on Friday – New Zealand's darkest day. An act of hatred has claimed 50 innocent lives; men, women and children. The Muslim community were attacked at their most vulnerable, while going about their everyday lives.

Building on what Reverend Peters said yesterday in Chapel, we have to accept difference. What a boring place this world would be without it! We need to bring our difference but, in order to do so, a positive environment needs to be created so that people feel confident about expressing it. You are not any bigger or any smaller than the person next to you. We are all human beings no matter what race, gender, sexuality, skin colour or beliefs we have. We are equal.

Despite there being so much evil, we need to also acknowledge the good that has arisen from such a horrible event. There are countless heroes – the brave that tried to stop the shooter, those who put themselves before others, the doctors and emergency staff working tirelessly to help the injured, and those in the community that are showing support for the affected. Unfortunately, this is not the first time Christchurch has experienced such devastation. The one thing it has given us, however, is an awesome sense of community support – something no one will ever be able to take away from us.

The love that is being shown at the moment is overwhelming. People are uniting as one. The ongoing legacy will be measured if we as a community all have the same love, trust and respect for each other not next week, not next year, but in 10 and 20 years' time. Let's not forget this and ensure our community remains as strong as it has been after this atrocity.

The way forward

The whole Christ's College community of staff and students gathered in Chapel on Monday morning to acknowledge the tragedy of Friday's terrorist attack. Friday's events went against everything we talk about in Chapel – for example, acceptance of diversity and celebration of difference. We are blessed that meeting in this way is part of who we are as Christ's College.

In Chapel, we focused on the insight articulated by Martin Luther King Jr when he said, "Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that".

This led us to remember the good in people, including the good between us and within each of us, the goodness that Christians and Muslims call God.

And however we name that goodness, this is our only way forward.

We can care for each other. We can be gentle with ourselves. We can take care when within ourselves we notice fear of people different from ourselves. In a school in which we study Islam with respect, we can take care not to spread ignorance and hatred and fear.

There is a book in Chapel for people to come in any time and write a message. This book will be given to the Muslim community of Christchurch from us all together – students, staff, all of us. We are also going to collect so that we can make a financial contribution.

Grant Fowlds - The life of a Frontline Conservationist

Tuesday 26 March 2019, 7pm, Chapman Room

Grant Fowlds is a passionate Conservationist from a dedicated Rhino Family, who pioneered with others a Wildlife project called Amakhala Game Reserve –now a leading Tourism brand based in the Eastern Cape, South Africa. As an Ambassador for Project Rhino and speaker, he has spread the word to an audience in several countries including Consumer Countries of South East Asia. He relates his first-hand experience of growing up in a natural environment with the consequences of 21st century greed for animals in the exploding demand in all forms of animal trafficking. His presentation is centred on the vast increase in rhino poaching in the last decade, where animals are in serious threat of extinction. The presentation climaxes on his personal walk in a rhino project and a race against the theory – 'endangered means we still have time but extinction is forever'.



From the Archives: Was your ancestor at Christ's College 150 years ago?

Was he here when College looked like this?



Christ's College 1869

In this photograph of College in 1869, the buildings left to right are: The Chapel, Big School, the Second Master's House and the Headmaster's House; the road between the two fences is Antigua Street, now known as Rolleston Avenue; and in the foreground is Raven's Paddock, named for Rev. John Raven, who arrived in 1853 on board the *Minerva*.

Although the College roll was officially 90 in 1869, further investigation has found there were 118 boys at College at some time during that year. In the first published School List of December 1869, 96 boys were on the roll, so there was certainly fluidity in numbers, with a consequent variation in class sizes throughout the year.

Three years prior to this, in 1866, Headmaster William Chambers Harris had begun to make much more detailed notes about staff, boys and the subjects taken by each class. When this information is added to George Gordon's (303) plan of Big School in 1867–1868, we have a good idea of the interior of the teaching space.

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George Gordon's recollections of Big School 1867–1868

With its high stud and unlined walls, a stove in the centre of the room would barely have warmed anyone except the Headmaster and Edward Athelstan Worthy, who were conveniently close to the fireplaces. Thomas De Renzy Condell, who was both a teacher and a Somes Scholar, and Captain Simmons, the Drilling and Mathematical


Master, were somewhat further away. Although not mentioned on the plan, there was also a French Master, Monsieur Bellemin, and a Music Master, James Francis McCardell.

The subjects varied little from class to class. All boys took Divinity, although the portion of the Bible and the parts of the catechism that were studied varied. English included grammar, spelling and dictation, depending on which form they were in. Classics meant Latin and Greek for Forms V and VI, and Latin alone in Forms II to IV. Classical History was also part of the course. Geography is included in the School Records for Forms II to V, while History appears to be missing for the IVth Form. French was introduced in the Lower Vth. There were three music classes across the entire College, and Mathematics was divided into seven divisions.

In the list that follows, the 19 boys whose names are in italics were boarders in the Headmaster's House, while the 17 boys whose names are in bold text were boarders in Rev. George Cotterill's House, including three of his sons. This was a time of transition for Cotterill. He had stopped teaching at College at the end of 1868, however, the Governing Body resolved to allow him to remain in the Second Master's House and take boarders for a further two years in recognition of his services to College. By 1870 he was taking boarders in his own house on a section that ran through from Cashel Street to Cambridge Terrace, almost opposite the Antigua Boat Sheds.
