E oku tuakana, e aku tuahine, te whānau Whānui o Te Kāreti o te Karaiti, kia tau ngā manaakitinga me ngā atawhainga katoa o tō tātau nei Atua ki runga l a tātau katoa.

It is a privilege to be writing to you as the 21st

Board Chair (formerly sub-warden) of College, having taken office after the last board meeting of 2024. I am mindful that my predecessors include people – such as the Reverend Henry Jacobs, Sir George Harper, Sir Robert Heaton Rhodes, and Julian Holderness – who spent a significant portion of their lives serving College.

Included in that list is my immediate predecessor, Hugh Lindo. For more than 25 years, Hugh has served College as, variously, CCOBA committee member and President during the earthquakes, College solicitor, Board member for 11 years, and Chair for five.

During his time as Chair, Hugh continued his history of excellent service – notably by leading the College response to the Royal Commission of Inquiry into Abuse in Care, responding to the Covid-19 pandemic, and leading the recruitment of Joe Eccleton as Executive Principal. Thank you, Hugh, for all you have done.

As College enters its 175th year, it is a school in very good heart, with an outstanding Principal and staff and boys who somehow achieve more each year. The founders of our school would be delighted in so many ways with the flourishing of College.

In saying that, College faces a challenging environment in many ways. We continue to have constrained finances and significant costs associated with our heritage campus. However, those challenges can, and will be, met by us.

In 2025, we will be prioritising the development, with Joe Eccleton and his team, of a new strategic plan for 2025–2030. We will also be focusing on certain operational priorities focused on our academic programme, character education, financial performance, and administrative processes.

We will also be updating the way we report to our community. College is a unique institution, founded by deed and governed, in part, by Acts of Parliament, and with the Board acting as legal owner. The reality, though, is that College is owned by its community – Church, Old Boys, and parents – and, as a Board, we want to more clearly acknowledge that in our reporting.

What will remain unchanging is our commitment to College's core identity. We are committed to ensuring College is New Zealand's leading independent secondary school for boys – achieved through commitment to our Anglican faith, academic rigour, co-curricular excellence, and the health and wellbeing of the boys in our care.

papers, should a student seek an exam reconsideration. Final results will be available later in Term 1.

Although not an NCEA qualification, the co-requisites are NZQA assessments that are required in order to gain the Level 2 and 3 certificates. At the end of 2024, of the 145 Year 10 students who sat the numeracy corequisite, 93.79% passed it on the first attempt.

Additionally, 99% of Year 11 students had passed the co-requisite reading and 97% the writing assessment by the end of the year.

**Students only complete the numeracy assessment in Year 10. The literacy assessment is sat in Year 11.

Electric Avenue 21–22 February

With this music festival now being held over two days in North Hagley Park and the high numbers expected to attend, there will be changes to routines for boarders and dayboys.

As many families will be aware, the disruption to the boarding Houses is significant. As a consequence, we have decided to close Flower's House, Richards House, and School House. While boarders will be able to stay in Jacobs House over the two days, we strongly encourage families to take their children home or move them to a friend's house. We have found that the restrictions on our students' access to the campus and the impact on their sleep during Electric Avenue have been significant.

We are changing the routine for the day on Friday 21 February, with all boys now finishing school at 1pm. Further details will be sent to parents.

Athletics Day

Please note that the Christ's College Athletics Day will be held on Friday 14 February at Ngā Puna Wai. This is a week earlier than the previous year.

Dining Hall lunches – dayboys

We have limited places available for dayboys to have lunch in the Dining Hall from Monday–Friday. Lunch will be served from Thursday 30 January and cost \$14 per day. You need to commit to a full term – five days per week – so that we can confirm numbers and catering requirements with the kitchen staff. Lunches will be charged to your son's account. Child Protection Policy

Fundamental to schools is child protection and safety and, with this in mind, this year, as a normal part of our professional learning cycle, all College staff will undergo further training with the respected New Zealand-based organisation Child Matters.

This training is part of being employed at the school and provides confidence for parents that our staff are informed and proactive in recognising and reporting any signs of child mistreatment, both within and beyond the school. This training also reminds all staff of their professional obligations in relation to their appropriate conduct and boundaries, both while in school and beyond, when engaging with children and reinforces policies College has had in place for several years. Throughout the year, students will again have sessions that match those of the staff so that our culture of safety and reporting is maintained as part of the College experience.

Make a good impression

We expect all boys to take care of their appearance and maintain high standards of personal care. Our uniform and grooming standards encourage selfrespect and self-management and instil a sense of pride in being part of the College community.

We appreciate your support in reinforcing these expectations. We want to begin the year well and highlight that unless boys have a couple of haircuts per term, a school-enforced absence may result. Housemasters are the first port of call regarding the standards outlined below, and we ask that parents and students act on their advice.

Uniform

All boys should have

- clean uniform
- belts (black) for their shorts and trousers
- black shoes (either lace-up or slip-on) – not boots
- shirts that fit around the neck
- short black and white socks.

Hair

Boys must be clean-shaven at all times and should make sure their hair

- is kept neat, clean, and tidy
- is kept clear of the collar, off the ears, and off the eyebrows
- is not dyed or gelled, tied up or pinned
- is not shorter than a 'number 2'
- does not have lines or designs shaved into it, or sideburns that extend below the opening to the ear
- does not have long sections that can be fashioned into long fringes, dreadlocks, plaits, rats' tails, mohawks, top knots or mullets.

There may be some exceptions to the above for cultural or other reasons. Deputy Principal – Planning & Co-curricular Darrell Thatcher will be final arbiter of any decisions relating to hair and personal appearance.

Any boy not meeting the guidelines will be sent to the barber for a haircut, with the cost being added to your account. This includes trimming fringes, a common issue.

literacy tutor, and fitness instructor. She joins College as a teacher aide.


