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## NCEA results

Congratulations to those students who completed their NCEA Levels 2 and 3 qualifications at the end of last year. There are many fantastic individual results. In particular, we would like to wish our 2025 leavers the very best as they embark on the next steps in their journeys – be that tertiary, employment, trade or travel.

Just a reminder that access to individual results, papers, and cut scores is via the 'student hub'. It can be found on the NZQA website once boys have logged in. The student hub also has information relating to the returning of papers, should a student seek an exam reconsideration. Final results will be available later in Term 1.

Although not an NCEA qualification, the co-requisites are NZQA assessments that are required in order to gain the Level 2 and 3 certificates. At the end of 2025, of the Year 10 students who sat the numeracy co-requisite, 92% passed it on the first attempt. Additionally, 99% of Year 11 students had passed the co-requisite reading and 98.6% the writing assessment by the end of the year.

**\*\*Students only complete the numeracy assessment in Year 10. The literacy assessment is sat in Year 11.**

From a legal and health and safety perspective, we are required to know where students are at all times. As such, our process for reporting an absence is vital. ### Electric Avenue Friday 27 February–Saturday 28 February

With the Electric Avenue music festival being held over two days in North Hagley Park and the high numbers expected to attend, there will be changes to the routines for boarders and dayboys.

As many families will be aware, the disruption to the boarding houses is significant. As a consequence, we have decided to close Flower's House, and School House. While boarders will be able to stay in Richards House over the two days, we strongly encourage families to take their boys home or move them to a friend's house. We have found that the restrictions on our students' access to the campus and the impact on their sleep during Electric Avenue have been significant.

We are changing the routine for Friday 27 February, with all boys finishing school at 1pm.

### Boarding and Public Holidays

Over the past few years, fewer boys have been staying in the boarding houses over long weekends. At times, only one or two boys remain in a House, which is not ideal for the boys' welfare. As a consequence, we will combine the Houses for Labour Weekend and Show Weekend in Term 4.

This year, all Houses will be open for the Waitangi Weekend, while the King's Birthday Weekend will remain an exeat weekend, as has been the tradition at Christ's College.

At Labour Weekend, Flower's House will be open, with Richards House and School House closed. Boys are welcome to move to Flower's House for the weekend. At Show Weekend, School House will remain open, with Flower's House and Richards House closed. Boys are welcome to move to School House for the weekend.

### Dining Hall lunches – dayboys

We have limited places available for dayboys to have lunch in the Dining Hall from Monday–Friday. Lunch will be served from Tuesday 3 February and cost

\$14.50 per day. You need to commit to a full term – five days per week – so that we can confirm numbers and catering requirements with the kitchen staff. Lunches will be charged to your son's account. Please [register here](#) for dayboy lunches in the Dining Hall.

### Child Protection Policy

Fundamental to schools is child protection and safety and, with this in mind, this year, as a normal part of our professional learning cycle, all College staff will undergo further training with the highly respected New Zealand-based organisation, Child Matters. This training is part of being employed at the school and provides confidence for parents that our staff are informed and proactive in recognising and reporting any signs of child mistreatment, both within and beyond the school. This training also reminds all staff of their own professional obligations in relation to their appropriate conduct and boundaries, both while in school and beyond, when engaging with children and reinforces policies College has had in place for a number of years. Throughout the year, students will again have sessions that match those of the staff so that our culture of safety and reporting is maintained as part of the College experience. 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## Metro school services 2026

### There are key changes to school routes 741 and 742 from Sumner to City and Merivale schools:

- The Metro timetable has been adjusted to better suit school start times, and an earlier timetable on Wednesday afternoons has been added to Route 741.
- Route 741 now starts at St Andrew's College, and no longer stops at Selwyn House because of low passenger numbers.
- Students on 742 can transfer to the 3 at Ferrymead shops for journeys to Sumner.

## Make a good impression

We expect all boys to take care of their appearance and maintain high standards of personal care. Our uniform and grooming standards encourage self-respect and self-management and instil a sense of pride in being part of the College community.

We appreciate your support in reinforcing these expectations. We want to begin the year well and highlight that unless boys have a couple of haircuts per term, a school-enforced absence may result. Housemasters are the first port of call regarding the standards outlined below, and we ask that parents and students act on their advice.

### Uniform

All boys should have:

- a clean uniform
- regulation belts (black and no large buckles) for their shorts and trousers
- black shoes (lace-up only); no boots
- shirts that fit around the neck
- short black socks, with a white stripe

There must be no holes in school blazers.

### Hair

Boys must be clean-shaven at all times and should make sure their hair

- is kept neat, clean, and tidy
- is kept clear of the collar, off the ears, and off the eyebrows
- is not dyed or gelled, tied up or pinned
- is not shorter than a 'number 2'
- does not have lines or designs shaved into it, or sideburns that extend below the opening to the ear
- does not have long sections that can be fashioned into long fringes, dreadlocks, plaits, rats' tails, mohawks, top knots or mullets.

There may be some exceptions to the above for cultural or other reasons. Senior Deputy Headmaster Darrell Thatcher will be the final arbiter of any decisions relating to hair and personal appearance.

Any boy not meeting the guidelines will be sent to the barber for a haircut, with the cost being added to your account. This includes trimming fringes, a common issue.

Workshop Technologies teacher Emma Bradley-Hudson has also resigned. A former Head of Department at College, Emma helped many boys hone their workshop skills.

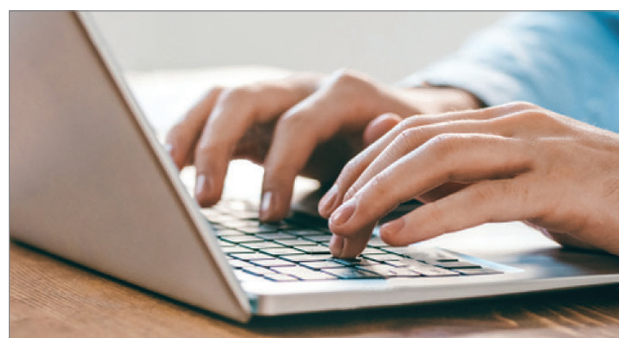
