During the holiday break, Japanese teacher Steve Everingham and I had the privilege and pleasure of being guests at the centenary celebrations of our sister school Konan Boys' High School in Kobe, Japan. Although just a little too late for the full beauty of cherry blossom season, the Konan campus still felt like an oasis of green, framed by the Rokko mountain range and overlooking the megalopolis of Kobe and Osaka out to Osaka Bay. Our hosts were generous and kind and we thoroughly enjoyed our time in their company.

One of the big initiatives Konan has introduced in its centenary year is the Konan Oral History Project, where current students interview Old Boys and record their recollections, experiences and advice for the future. They are creating a rich archive and resource for their community, and it is fascinating to reflect on how much the world has changed. I could not help but think that such a programme could bring real personality to our upcoming 175th celebrations in 2025.

College has long fostered its relationship with Konan and other schools around the world, and our recent membership of Round Square opens up many new opportunities. The benefits of such relationships are substantial, leading to better long-term cultural understanding, more educational exchanges and, above all, friendship. In early April, two groups from College headed overseas to attend Round Square Australasia and East Asia regional conferences – one to Shenzhen, China, and the other to Woodleigh School, Melbourne.

By all accounts, everyone had an amazing time. Such experiences are an ideal way for our boys to develop global competence, one of the character attributes of the ideal College graduate and essential in order to successfully navigate modern life.

Our focus on health and wellbeing as part of our pastoral care and Positive Education programmes has been a change for good and, as a result, College is becoming a more caring and inclusive environment.

As well as focusing on the boys, we also want the broader community of College to benefit. Consequently, we have a number of interesting Parent Education evenings coming up in Term 2. Our mission is *Each boy at his best*. Our ideal is to create a personalised learning environment where we work with the boys so they identify their strengths and abilities and have the confidence and commitment to pursue their learning goals – whether that be in class led by a teacher or independently when their teacher is absent. Our academic programme caters for a wide range of abilities and we believe every boy has the opportunity to grow toward learning independence.

Two recent examples of achieving excellence in education are 2018 graduates Wills Wynn Thomas and Josh Murison. Wills was Academic Head of School – or Dux – and he will start his undergraduate degree at the University of Cambridge later in the year, after receiving a prestigious Sir Douglas Myers Scholarship. It is a fantastic opportunity and Wills no doubt has a bright future ahead.

Assistant Principal – Academic Joe Eccleton and I will join Wills and Josh and their families at the Top Scholar Awards Ceremony to be hosted at Parliament in May. Their achievement in reaching this level of success reflects how College creates an environment that enables boys to find support at the right level, at the right time and in individual areas of interest and their ability to work independently toward their goals.

Playing with Fire

The senior Drama season, *Playing with Fire*, features two of the twentieth century's most provocative and thought-provoking plays – *The Arsonists*, a black comic parable by Max Frisch, and *Lord of the Flies*, adapted for the stage by Nigel Williams from the book by William Golding – both of which still resonate today.

“Like all good drama, these plays give us an opportunity to examine and question the human condition,” says Assistant Director of Drama and *The Arsonists* director Robyn Peers. “While *The Arsonists* focuses on the need to stand up against evildoers, *Lord of the Flies* turns on what happens when we rip apart the fragile veil of civilisation. Each in its own way reflects the idea that the only thing necessary for evil to triumph is for good men to do nothing.”

Managing Learning

An on-going challenge for our teaching staff is managing the interruptions that occur to teaching programmes as a result of co-curricular activities, excursions for other subjects, special visits, or teacher absences. It is a conundrum for us all, but reflects the very nature of an independent school where so much is on offer. Such a dynamic programme demands good planning, flexibility and adaptability by all. It is further enabled by the expectation that our boys can work independently as, when and where required.

For a boy to know what to do when he is away or when a teacher is absent has been made much easier with the introduction of Schoolbox as our learning management system. By ensuring academic programmes are available and up-to-date instructions are delivered to each boy, any disruptions have less impact on learning. Boys can just get on with it! Nothing can replace our teachers or classroom time, but online information and guidance has certainly helped make the expectation of independent yet purposeful learning, especially for our older boys, more the norm.

During Term 1, there has been a move to providing more relief cover in the Library, which has seen many boys reintroduced to one of the more pleasant learning environments at College. This continues to be a work in progress as we balance class needs with the expectations of teaching staff and the needs of the boys, but I am encouraged by our beginning and the way we are developing in boys the ability to take charge when the need demands.

Bicultural Development

On my arrival in 2016 the Board of Governors outlined their expectation that College should foster and develop a more biculturally sensitive and educative environment. To date, this has seen the introduction of Te Reo as a compulsory language in Year 9, a greater emphasis on Tikanga Māori protocols and practices, the introduction of a new College Waiata and Haka, and changes in campus signage. Part of our professional learning for teachers has focused on the importance of understanding biculturalism in the New Zealand context. A staff Bicultural Committee has been meeting on a regular basis and in Term 2 students will be invited to join this group, along with parent representatives in Term 3. College has much to do in this space, but we are on the way to developing a programme that will assist our boys to be biculturally competent citizens.

Robyn is working with Year 13 students, plus two female guest actors from Cashmere High School, on *The Arsonists*, which will open on Sunday 12 May for three performances only. Director of Drama David Chambers is juggling two casts of Year 12 students, who will alternate in performances of *Lord of the Flies* on Thursday 16 and Saturday 18, and Friday 17 and Sunday 19 May.

“We’ve got good strong casts and compelling stories. The boys are relishing taking on these action-packed pieces that look at the human capacity for evil,” says David. “In the *Playing with Fire* drama season we’re going all out to develop performance skills in exciting plays designed to both entertain and challenge the audience.”
