FROM THE HEADMASTER



The College was saddened last week by the death of David Clay. Despite battling cancers since the end of 2010, he maintained his position as one of the academic stars of the school and had a place at Cambridge to read engineering. The College will be able to farewell David at his funeral in the Chapel on Wednesday. We know many of his leaver cohort from last year

will join friends, family and current staff and students to celebrate the life of a talented and very popular young man, who inspired us all with his resilience, optimism and good humour. The service begins at 2.00pm.

To lesser matters:

I was away at Quad Tournament for the parents' evening, featuring our projected clock. I gather it went well, and perhaps helped a little to keep things moving along.

It was good to see so many parents at our recent information evening on ICT developments. Particularly pleasing was that the questions asked were almost exclusively educational, a reassuring indication that things are moving forward with a shared ambition for real progress in learning. The collaborative potential of our systems prompted me to change the habits, if not quite of a lifetime, at least the last three years and create this *In Black & White* newsletter in Google Docs, shared directly with my secretary. A further indication of irresistible progress was when I sent a message over to our IT offices last week, hoping they could find me a new memory stick



on which to store a presentation. I had the distinct impression I had asked for a Moa bone; I have no idea what 'the cloud' actually is (who does?) but apparently we now live there and don't need memory devices. I think William Wordsworth should start again: 'I wandered lonely through the cloud..'

Our winter sporting codes are wrapping up their seasons, and all can be pleased with what they have achieved. The 1st XV's season ended with another hard match, in which once again they just missed the result which they so dearly wanted. Setting aside the disappointment to what has been a remarkable team, the match was sadly marred by spectator behaviour supporting the opposition. Most significant was consistent abuse of the match officials. Our sports, in all



codes, rely on the availability of volunteer officials; whilst they may face similar treatment in some club matches, schools should be pro-active in ensuring it is not tolerated. I will raise the general issue of supporter culture with the competition organisers at the end of the season, seeking some agreed actions by all schools. Two 'supporters' from last weekend are easily identified and will be barred from the school in the future.

The media have recently had an enthusiastic burst of school data'itis. The 'best' schools in the country were defined in one survey as those with the greatest number of scholarships achieved, but these figures were not related to school size. No one likes league tables, and no thinking person is impressed by them, but if they are going to be there, one would like to be in them! Whilst it may be thought disappointing not to see the College mentioned, I feel obliged to offer some reassurance! Using some of the schools trumpeted in the media, I humbly offer the following:

It would be unhelpful to make explicit local comparisons. Had I done so, using 9-13 roll numbers only, it would have revealed the next best independent local school's figures as .059 and .009, and a large local state school as .015 and .0008. But these sort of statistics take no account of any decisions about entry in the first place, alternative examinations entered etc, and so are of little value. They might however be seen as at least as useful as a 'top school' table based on a simple scholarship number.

The cathedral's first service in their new building was a delightful experience; I urge all to have a look at it, and in particular the charming memorial side chapel. It is a beautiful piece of design, with two fluid shaped walls which fold over each other to enclose the space when not in use. Opening one, creates a mysterious curved entrance, and opening both wide gives the potential for small gatherings to use it. It is a little piece of Shigeru Ban magic, as are the chairs - made from a replicated boomerang shape arranged in different orientations and glued together. The whole building has a delicate Japanese feel, but also strong Wharenui references. I hope Christchurch embraces it - we are lucky to have what is sure to become an appreciated piece of architecture in the city.

We are now just four weeks away from the College ball weekend, and I hope all are getting their tables arranged; it is going to be a wonderful occasion.

I was a little disappointed not to have an ornithologist advise me on the nesting habits of paradise ducks following my last newsletter, so will instead appeal for your help with an altogether more pressing issue. The staff award a trophy for a member of the community who distinguishes him/ herself with a demonstration of conspicuous stupidity. The holder must find someone else deserving to pass it on to. Should you be aware of one of my colleagues who might qualify, do let me know. My interest in this matter is personal and urgent. I will say no more.

CURRICULUM NEWS



Term 3 is short and intense in every aspect of College life, and it is easy to lose sight of the underlying academic demands. The term includes trial examinations from 22 to 27 August, and I took the time last week after assembly to remind all boys of the importance of these trial examinations both as practice and feedback opportunities as they head towards external examinations, but

also as a source of achievement data for derived grades.

Derived grades are the grades that are available should any unfortunate event prevent a boy from sitting any NCEA external examinations in November or performing at his best in any of the examinations. Schools cannot estimate or invent these grades. They must be based upon actual achievement data, and the examinations offer the most reliable source of that data. Our Year 13 boys will still hold a range of memories of the significance of this data in 2011.

Last Thursday we held the first of our planned information evenings on the 2014 Laptop Programme implementation, and it was gratifying to see the number of parents who were able to join us. We were also excited by the range and quality of the questions, all thoughtful, and all focused on learning. This was particularly gratifying because the laptop move is one driven by the desire to improve learning. The research evidence, and our own experience, supports the view that students writing electronically will write more material and that they will think more deeply, producing better quality material. Our teaching staff understand that this is not fundamentally about the technology, but about the teaching pedagogy, the approaches to improving learning. The technology is merely another tool, and we are at pains to emphasise the point that it has always been, and will continue to be, a question of using the right tool for the job.

We were pleased to have the input of Mr Mark Osborne throughout the day with staff, and during the evening. Mark currently works for CORE Education, and has vast experience in the implementation of BYOD technology in schools. During the course of his presentation he offered several useful web sites from which parents can better equip themselves with information on how to 'manage' their boys' online behaviour.

We have created a new page on the College web site called 'eLearning', under the Information tab, where we have posted a range of information that we hope will answer many of your questions. Links to the two parent information web sites mentioned by Mark are also on that web page.

We are planning to repeat this evening in Term 4, and are also hoping to offer several skills based evenings for parents at which you can take a look at some of the uses that your sons are making of this technology to improve their learning.

Boys are now being asked to make initial subject selections for 2014. They have received plenty of guidance to help them make their choices, and of course have the opportunity to come along to the course selection evening with you this evening to gather further advice. Selections are made online, boys have been given clear instructions on how to make their selections, and these are due next Wednesday 21 August. Boys can change their selections later on, but this first set of choices allows us to begin the process of timetable construction, perhaps the most complex administration task in any school.

And finally a last reminder that Financial Assistance applications are due on 23 August.

LIBRARY MATTERS

"The evidence continues to accumulate that libraries – and their staff – lie absolutely at the heart of 3rd millennium learning organisations - a place for scholarship, a place to escape into adventures, a place of discovery, a place to share and explore, a place for surprise and, above all else, a place absolutely without limits." Stephen Heppell (2010)

In an educational environment that is increasingly digitally focused, libraries perhaps need to question how they will aid students to access 'good' information. Boys and probably most teachers use Google as the one stop shop for finding out, accessing and discovering new information. And Google is great if you know how



to 'hack' it in order to get it to search for the information that you want, rather than the information that it thinks you want.

It will come as no surprise that there are alternatives! One such is http://www.sweetsearch.com/

And it is great. In fact it is fantastic! This is because it does what the students need. It provides authentic searches of reliable information that has already been evaluated by librarians and researchers. It also uses keywords to help you search quickly for the information that you require.

So the role of the 21st Century library is not in doubt. It is essential; to provide activities that give students the opportunity to examine information related to their task from a variety of theoretical and practical perspectives, and for teaching a variety of ways to search for sources and resources.

School libraries maintain and increase their value in 21st century education as they continue to collect and give organised access to information from multiple viewpoints over the range of disciplines and knowledge systems.






This is one of my favourite photographs of Christ's College. Taken on 30 October 1867 by Dr Alfred Charles Barker, it is one of the earliest images of the Quad.

Dr Barker arrived on the Charlotte Jane on 16 December 1850. During the long sea voyage it is believed that he took the opportunity to learn the wet-plate collodion process from Benjamin Woolfield Mountfort, as well as undertaking his work as surgeon-superintendent on the ship. His first home was a tent -"Studding Sail Hall" and he looked after the wide ranging medical needs of the whole Canterbury area until the death in 1858 of his wife Emma, five weeks after the birth of their eighth child.

Barker's association with Christ's College was as a Fellow (1858-1873), as a parent from 1853 when six of his sons attended,





Producing a photograph at this time was no easy matter. It involved complex chemistry to get the emulsion onto the glass plates that captured the images. These were in short supply, so Barker improvised by "borrowing" glass from windows and when the gold and silver salts took too long to arrive from England he melted coins, silverware and cutlery. Once the glass plate negatives were taken, they still had to be printed and so Barker cut his own paper, coated it with egg white and hung it out to dry. He had a photographic shed in his second house on the corner of Oxford Terrace and Worcester Street, but he also created a mobile van where the glass plate could be coated, exposed and developed all within 15 minutes or it would loose its sensitivity and then no longer able to produce an image. Many of his photographs were taken early in the morning because the long exposure time meant that the chances of people of moving were very high. There is surprisingly no movement in this photo of Christ's College.

The detail of the photograph shows that the Quad was little more than a paddock, but amongst the weeds there is a well defined cricket pitch and wickets. By enlarging the figures in the centre background it is possible to recognise Robert Speechly, the architect of the newly completed chapel while the other main figure may be the Rev'd James Wilson. The post and rail fences that enclosed the whole site can be seen between the two buildings, and they proved to be ideal places to tie up the horses that many boys and Fellows relied upon for transport. Interestingly there are no patterns in the Big School slates.

It is a photograph that captures the permanence of College and the centrality of these two buildings to the many changes that have gone on around them in the past 146 years, including not walking on the Quad - let alone playing cricket!

We followed in the footsteps of these remarkable people from the isolated Oihi Bay where Samuel Marsden preached the first service on Christmas Day to Kemp House in Keri Keri, the picture perfect Holy Trinity Church at Pakaraka and the early Catholic printery at Pompellier House, Russell.

Everywhere we went we imbibed the early stories of the foundation of Christianity in New Zealand. It was fun, it brought history to life but above all it was an evocative pilgrimage.

1ST XI FOOTBALL v OLD BOYS MATCH


