
The rugby 1st XV had a season wind-up breakfast the following Saturday. It was a celebration of all that is good in sport; some disappointment that a few games were lost to the narrowest of margins, but also pride and delight at the quality of the team as a whole, and of the individuals who made it. It is some consolation that The Press Cup was won by a team with whom we drew 10-10. Recent media interest in



the 'professionalising' of school sport, and 'winning is all that matters' particularly in Auckland, would suggest some schools could learn a little from the atmosphere on that morning.

We have been able to sympathise with the residents of the Marlborough region and Wellington over recent weeks, particularly those who moved north after the events in Christchurch. There are also a number of our alumni studying in Wellington, who could reasonably have expected a respite from such activity. From a less generous Christchurch perspective, the re-awakened awareness that nowhere in New Zealand is immune from such things, can only encourage a more optimistic view of our city as it regenerates; we have had a sequence of experiences without precedent, the chances of a repeat are minimal for hundreds of years, the rebuilt city centre will be the safest urban environment in the country, and the region has acquired a unique modern history to interest visitors.

Our own regeneration has suddenly leapt forward with substantial progress on our enormous West Wing foundations and the arrival of the first wall sections. For the first time the scale of the buildings is emerging, and whilst the open view from the library is about to be lost once more, we can't fail to be excited by the progress.





At a Board meeting two weeks ago I was asked to develop a document setting out the longer term campus priorities. The intention is to signal our overall direction; and this will be shared with the community shortly.

Our state school colleagues last week received the frustrating and dispiriting news that the Ministry of Education's 'master plan' for the repair and renovation of state schools in Christchurch has been cancelled. It appears schools will now 'self evaluate' and form a competitive queue. It seems a depressing scenario for the future, at the very time when all need and deserve a sense of direction. It seems likely that, in some cases, improvised and under-maintained buildings may remain for years. Just as many people comment on the dispiriting impact in their own homes of putting off the usual redecoration, upgrading and renewal because of uncertainty over repair plans, we sympathise with those dependent on the Ministry of Education's resources and should certainly appreciate and value the environment our boys are able to share.

The innovation of wearing 'stripes' on Tuesdays appears to have been well received, but the boys have been told their part of the deal is consistently wearing their socks up. It is worth noting that being allowed to wear shorts in terms 2 and 3 is a relatively recent development; historically it was long trousers only in winter. The boys are required to keep their socks up and they should not leave

home without the means to do that. I am sure parents would prefer their investment earned interest through more profitable staff activity than daily skirmishing in the war of sartorial terrorism. Homes of some recidivists may receive a letter seeking parental permission to use an industrial staple gun.

I am told Ball tickets are flying away. The total is already ahead of last year's final figure, and there is now a real prospect of selling out. Marvellous news. I do urge you to avoid disappointment by contacting the school this week.

Finally, our new entrants have been allocated to their houses for 2014. I was asked by one young chap how we did this. I am not sure he believed me.

It was wonderful to see so many of you at the Parent Information evening as we prepare to launch our laptop programme in 2014. We recorded much of the presentation material, and this has been added to eLearning on the College website, found under 'Information'. This page also includes a lot of other general information that we hope will answer many questions.

We have arranged for an easy purchase service, through Cyclone Computers, as have a number of other independent schools in Christchurch. You can make your purchase online by going to www.cyclone.co.nz and selecting 'Christ's College'. The password is cc2014. Cyclone Computers is charging the Apple Education price plus an additional \$40 to cover the installation of Christ's College recommended software. Remember that you are free to purchase from whomever you choose.

With trial examinations now over, I am reminded of the classic student question 'does this count?' Of course everything counts, but it depends on the context of the question. I made comment in my last column on the need for valid authentic

assessment evidence for the award of derived grades, but that isn't the most significant way in which trial examinations count.

The biggest error that students make when studying is to study those things that they know already. The trial examination papers offer the best study guide possible because they represent an extensive catalogue of aspects of a subject that require more work. Of course every piece of practice assessment offers exactly the same opportunity, just sitting there for the taking.

Staff will prepare full reports for all seniors before the end of term, and you can expect to have these in your hands early in the term break. Careful review of examination papers when they are returned engages so many of Art Costa's Habits of Mind: thinking flexibly, striving for accuracy, and thinking and communicating with clarity to name three. As we now head down the 'home straight' towards final examinations in November, encourage your son to plan his study programme carefully in order to make best use of these wonderful documents, these wonderful catalogues. Combining this with action on the advice that is offered in those final reports is perhaps a vital ingredient of success in these last vestiges of each year's academic programme. Persistence pays!

#### **Study Link – Student Loans and Allowances**

The Study Link "sussed" programme is about helping students make decisions about their finances and studies as they move out of school and into tertiary education. On September 13 (new date) StudyLink will be at General Studies and will help the boys to apply online. Boys will need to bring their IRD and Bank account numbers to this session.

#### Online Halls applications

All boys should have applied online to the universities for a place in a hall for 2014. They can apply for more than one university and make a choice when positions in halls are offered. They have indicated to me where they want their confidential reference sent. If they no longer want it sent to a university they should inform me as soon as possible.

#### **Victoria University Scholarships**

Excellence Scholarships: applicants only need to complete the online form - no additional information is required. Victoria need the NSN number to check Level 2 results from Year 12. Up to 400 will be awarded in 2014, valued at \$5,000 for the first year of study and 20 Vice-Chancellor's Scholarships valued at \$20,000 over three years.

Victoria Achiever: applicants will need to supply additional documentation. 75 will be awarded, valued at \$5,000 for the first year of study, and five Vice-Chancellor's Scholarships valued at \$20,000 over three years.

#### **Course Planning sessions**

This involves the universities looking at the proposed course of study for 2014 and checking that appropriate subjects are being taken. Most boys have a good idea about this as we have gone through the process during the year. The liaison officers come to College for these sessions.

Christ's College had two teams entered. Team 1 consisted of Matthew Moore, Hamish Thomas and Angus Dysart-Paul, and Team 2 were Samuel Walker, Jason Guan and Jack Murison.

While our less experienced second team lost all three of their debates, their performance significantly improved each time. Jack said that a highlight for him was being 3rd speaker for the first time; he enjoyed the challenge of having to speak off the top of his head in a high pressure situation. It was particularly pleasing to have the Head of Debating from St Bede's come over after a very narrow win to congratulate our boys on their lovely manners and good sportsmanship.

Team 1 were the team to look out for right from the start. Matthew was superb in his case building, Hamish devastating in his use of POIs, and Angus capped this all off with a range of ruthless rebuttal. The boys systematically decimated the opposition, who were, incidentally, primarily Year 11 students, to go through to the finals unbeaten, as were their Year 11 counterparts, Kaiapoi A. The final, held in front of a large Kaiapoi-supporting contingent, was a very close affair, and resulted in a 3:2 split between the five adjudicators. Our boys kept their cool, and finally won the day.

A special congratulations goes to Angus Dysart-Paul, for being one of three Highly Commended Speakers at the tournament,

## FREDERICK GEORGE ANDREWS

As we move towards the recognition of the beginning of the First World War in 2014, from time to time this column will highlight the involvement of Old Boys and Masters in the war that was to end all wars. We begin with Frederick George Andrews (1296) who has always been acknowledged as the first Old Boy to be killed.

The trading of information amongst archivists and researchers is an important part of the spread of knowledge and an email query from Denis Kenyon of Hallaton, for information to expand the entry in his local memorial book led to much of this research.

Andrews was born in Christchurch on 2 December 1870, the son of Hugh Andrews, an accountant, and Mary Eliza (nee Hancock). His parents had been married at Christchurch- St Michael's, and he was baptized there by Henry Jacobs. A younger brother, Allan Harold also came to College, and he had three sisters; Mary Laura, Florence Emma and Ethel Aileen. The family lived in Windmill Rd, now known as Antigua Street, on part of Rural Section 79.

The next information available on Andrews is in 1881, when he was 11 years old and enrolled at Cathedral Grammar School. This school was opened "for the purpose of training boys for the Cathedral Choir, and in preparing them for higher schools". He auditioned for the Choir, was accepted, and joined 54 other boys when the school opened on 16 May 1881. As well as being taught divinity, Latin, French, Greek, history, geography, mathematics, writing and vocal music, 24 of the boys had five months to prepare for the opening of the Cathedral.

On 1 November 1881 Andrews was one of the surpliced and mortar-boarded boys who sat on a platform in the nave at 11am and 7.30pm and sang. But it did not end there, services involved the choir all week, until on Saturday, they and other children of the Diocese, were given cakes and ginger beer at the Deanery. The choristers' life was a very busy one; practice at 8.15am, Matins at 9.00am, school until 4.00pm interrupted by a midday service at 12.30pm twice a week, another practice, Evensong at 6.00pm, home, tea, prep and bed. In 1885 he was awarded the Bishop's Prize for good conduct in the choir and Mr Elton's Prize for good conduct in the House.

Arrival at Christ's College in May 1886, aged 15 must have been a welcome respite but he was plunged straight into the Middle 5th Form continuing many of the subjects that he had previously been taught. The June 1887 Register indicates that he was in the Cadet Corps, and played as a forward in the 1st XV of the Middle Club. The following year he was in the 2nd XI and in the Upper 5th Form, but by the time of the second term examinations he had left only to re-appear again at Cathedral Grammar School, this time as a teacher. He remained there until 1894. During that time he became involved with the Christchurch Rifle Volunteers and by 1893 he was their Captain. In 1890 he was appointed alto lay clerk at the Cathedral, and in 1894 was part of the YMCA Rowing Club. There is also evidence that he completed his first two undergraduate years at Canterbury College in 1889 and 1891.

His obituaries in The Press and in the Christ's College Register suggest that he travelled the world for a while, taught at King Edward's Grammar School, Saffron Waldon, Sussex. and tutored some county families. He was present at the Christ's College Old Boys' Association Dinner in 1899 and Denis Kenyon's research has found him at Orchard Farm, Horninghold in 1906. His 1915 newspaper obituary records that the



firm of Fletcher, Andrews and Part became noted shire horse breeders. He was certainly in the company of Herbert Fletcher, member of the Stock Exchange at 30 -room Hallaton Hall with 22 other members of the family, guests and servants on the night of 2 April 1911 when the English Census was taken.

By 1914 he was 43 years old and a lieutenant in the fourth battalion of The King's (Liverpool) Regiment. Kenyon's research in his attestation papers adds additional material - he claimed he was 10 years younger that he actually was. At the time of his death on 21 October he was attached to the 2nd Battalion, South Lancashire Regiment. This Regiment, again from Kenyons's research, landed at Le Havre on 14 August and took part in the battles of Mons, Le Cateau, the Marne and the Aisne. From 12 to 29 October the 2nd Lancashires' experienced severe fighting and heavy casualties at the Battle of La Bassée, losing seven officers and over two hundred men on the 21st alone. He is commemorated on the Le Touret Memorial, along with 13,478 other men, of whom 162 were from the same Regiment. The cemetery is in north eastern France, on the highway from Bethune to Armentieres. The World War I Medal cards show that he was awarded the British War Medal and the Victory Medal and his mother, who was by now living in Sydenham, England, applied for his 1914 Star.


This research has shown that Frederick George Andrews was as much part of another community in Leicestershire, as he was part of ours. The fact that we now know he is remembered in the Church of St Michael and All Angels, Hallaton as well as the Christ's College War Memorial is a recognition of these previously unrecognised connections.
